Second Friday in each month each box is tapped twice, testing boxes and circuit line. When alarm of fire is given the Fire Department has the right of way on all streets.

THE NEW CABINET.

COLD RECEPTION ACCORDED IT BY THE FRENCH PRESS.

The Mary Ann Siddals Case—Whitelaw Reid Winding Up Business—Date Set by His Friends for the Farewell Banquet to Be Given at Paris.

PARIS, March 1.—The new cabinet meets with a cold reception from the press. The conservative and radical journals agree in saying that the new cabinet is composed of the same members as the preceding cabinet.

Mr. Reid, the United States minister will probably be able to complete his official business within a fortnight, as the new cabinet contains ministers versed in the negotiations with the United States representatives. The proposed farewell banquet to Mr. Reid will take place on either March 16 or March 23.

The committee initiative for the Chicago fair is now organized.

The Siddals Assault.

LONDON, March 1.—John Goodall, the evangelist, was arraigned on the charge of having committed on Jan. 12 last, an assault which occasioned grievous bodily harm upon Mrs. Mary Ann Siddals. When the prisoner, who is about 33 years old and the son of a farmer living near Alton, was confronted with Mrs. Siddals she immediately identified him as the man who had been in the compartment of the car with her.

Barceois Is a Prisoner.

NEW YORK, March 1.—A dispatch from San Salvador to the Herald is as follows: It is stated here that General Reina Barceois, who some time ago returned from San Francisco to run as a candidate for the presidency, is a prisoner in the hotel where he is stopping with his family.

Steinitz Won the Match.

HAVANA, March 1.—Steinitz defeated Tschigorin in the twenty-third round and final game of the great chess match. The final score Steinitz 10 and Tschigorin 8, draw 5.

An Agreement Arrived At.

PARIS, March 1.—Whitelaw Reid, the American minister, and M. Jules Roche, minister of commerce, arrived at a definite agreement for the establishment of a commercial treaty between France and the United States.

Terrible Storm at Sea.

LONDON, March 1.—The Times' Oporto correspondent gives details of a frightful storm reported there Saturday. He says: "It is reported that thirty boats are lost and 300 persons drowned. The loss of life is probably greater."

Famine in Hungary.

LONDON, March 1.—Famine prevails in northern Hungary and 20,000 inhabitants of the country of Arva are in a state of distress equaling that prevalent in Russia.

PETER MAHER'S CONDITION.

Billy Madden Says He Is in Tip Top Shape.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 1.—Two young Irishmen, both evidently sports, attended the morning services at the Catholic church here. One was Peter Maher, who is to meet Bob Fitzsimmons in the prize ring at New Orleans. The other was Jack Fallons, one of his backers and trainer.

In an interview with Billy Madden in regard to Maher's condition and character he said:

"Peter's a good boy. He don't care a snap about being among sports. Why, if he wins that fight he will go off with some Irish friend or other and dance with the girls at some Irish reel. You won't catch him among the sports." "And do you think he will win?" "I don't know. We are not bragging. I understand the betting is three to one in Fitzsimmons' favor. I have \$30,000 with me to back Peter at such odds as that and I'll either lose or win." "Is he in good health?" "Yes, tip top. But you can say this for me. If Fitz is in the condition he is cracked up to be by the newspapers he is in just twice as good a condition as

Peter." "What does Maher weigh?" "The last time he weighed, stripped, he showed up at 177 pounds. When he goes in training he will weigh about 175 pounds. He is 5 feet 11 1/4 inches tall, 33 years old and the pluckiest boy I ever saw in my life."

Heavy Storm Raging.

PLEASANTVILLE, N. J., March 1.—A terrific gale has been raging here for the past twenty-four hours. The wind is from the northeast and blowing with hurricane force. The meadows between here and Atlantic City are submerged about a foot. The tracks of the Camden and Allegheny railroad are under water and trains are being delayed. It is reported that the tracks of the Ocean City railroad are under water.

Man of Worth.

NASHVILLE, March 1.—Physicians here have had quite a discussion during the past few days as to the sex of a convict named Hannah Baz, sent from Monroe county to serve one year for larceny. When brought here the convict had on man's clothing and persistently claimed to be a man, but requested that he, she or it be not placed in the man's wing. The warden called in the members of the State Board of Medical Examiners, who happened to be in session here, and several other physicians, and all signed a request that Gov. Buchanan grant a pardon on the ground that they could not determine the sex of the convict.

Hannah has small hands and feet and a woman's face, is rather good looking and aged 19. Governor Buchanan granted the pardon.

For Cuban Independence.

NEW YORK, March 1.—It is said that revolutionary movement has been started by the Cuban residents of this and other cities for the purpose of establishing Cuban independence. Three revolutionary clubs have been organized in this city within the past four days, with a total membership of 8000. Senor Jose Marti, the Uruguayan Consul, is said to be the promoter of them. Clubs have also been formed in Chicago and other cities. Next Sunday the Porto Ricans of New York will form a revolutionary movement to work in sympathy with Cubans.

A Bride Murdered.

NEWPORT, Ark., March 1.—News has reached here of a fatal shooting. A Mr. Swearingen and Miss Brattley were married and concluded to remain for the night at the home of the relatives of the bride. Some hours after retiring a charivari party arrived and called for the bride. Failing to respond, some miscreant shot through the window, fatally wounding the bride. An entire charge of buckshot was lodged in her head. It is not known who fired the shot.

Reduces the Interest.

ABILENE, Kas., March 1.—Judge Humphrey of the Fifth judicial district decided that the clause in all real estate mortgage notes that, in default of payment of interest, 12 per cent. instead of 7 or 8 per cent. could be charged from date until foreclosure was illegal, as it was in the nature of a penalty. The excessive interest can only be charged from maturity. It practically reduces the interest for investors 4 per cent. when there is a foreclosure.

What Sherman Says.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Senator Sherman's comment upon the published statement that he has made up his mind to resign from the senate is brief but comprehensive. He said: "There is not the slightest foundation for the story. I have never uttered to any one my purpose to resign, for I have never even contemplated it."

For President Diaz.

CITY OF MEXICO, March 1.—Eighty members from surrounding mining towns held a meeting in favor of the reelection of President Diaz, and a committee was appointed to convey the resolutions adopted to President Diaz. In replying to the resolutions President Diaz said he would continue to do everything in his power to promote the peace and progress of the country.

Ran to Death.

PITTSFIELD, Ill., March 1.—James Hayden, a wealthy farmer living five miles east of here, met a singular death. He was killing hogs when one of them broke away, and while pursuing it at full speed he tripped and fell, breaking his neck, causing instant death.

Found Dead in Bed.

LITTLE ROCK, March 1.—Charles Myer a prominent merchant of Plummerville, Ark., was found dead in his bed at the Summs Hotel at Plummerville. He retired at 11 o'clock in perfect health.

Silver Bill Resolution.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The rules committee has reported a resolution making the silver bill the special order for March 22, 23 and 24, and Mr. Catchings has given notice that he will call the resolution up next Monday.

Senator Sherman to Retire.

NEW YORK, March 1.—A Washington special has it that Senator Sherman will probably retire from the senate before the expiration of his term and that Secretary Foster is to succeed him.
