The resolution providing for the International and Great Northern railroad investigation passed in the last legislature required that the report of the investigating committee should be filed with the secretary of state by August 1, 1891. Interesting Little Episode in Senator Hill Refusing His Back Pay—Indiana Republicans for Harrison—Jackson County, Ill., Democrats Want Palmer.

PHILADELPHIA, March 5.—Considerable interest has been aroused by the announcement that arrangements that Senator Hill may get the Pennsylvania delegation to the national convention have been made by Mr. Singerly, who was recently in Washington as a member of a Philadelphia delegation on a visit to the appropriations committee to urge an appropriation for a new mint. When he heard the story Mr. Singerly said: "There is not a particle of truth in it. The facts are these: While in Washington with a mint delegation I saw a number of senators and among them Mr. Hill, whom I have known since 1884. We have only met three or four times in the interval and we had a good many things to discuss besides politics."

"Then you are not for Hill?" "Decidedly not. I am for Cleveland first, last and all the time. That ought to be definite enough. If I could do it I would designate him tomorrow as president of the United States. I admire Hill, of course, but I am positively for Cleveland for president."

Hill Refuses Full Pay.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—There was quite an interesting little episode in the rooms of the secretary of the senate. After the vote on the Idaho case had been taken Senator Hill strolled into the room and remarked that "if convenient he would talk a minute." Senator Hill's request was promptly responded to by the secretary, who placed before him his vouchers for an amount aggregating about \$5000 and asked him to sign them.

"Oh, no," said the senator. "The voucher for my salary from the day I was sworn in, the 7th of January, 1892, up to the end of February is all I want. This is your usual pay day, is it not, the end of the month?"

The clerk said they had a certain amount standing on their books to the credit of the New Yorker and not to pay it out would cause confusion.

With some brusqueness of manner Mr. Hill said this was none of his business—they must keep their book to suit themselves. He wished to draw salary for the actual time he had served. After some further parley the clerk made out a voucher for \$897.09 and Mr. Hill took a check for the amount in full payment of his claims on salary up to date; \$778 of this amount was for the salary of January and February and the balance was mileage.

Solid for Harrison.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 5.—Indiana's thirteen districts selected delegates to the Republican national convention. The delegation will be solid for Harrison.

Instructed for Palmer.

MURPHYSBORO, Ill., March 5.—The Democratic convention of this (Jackson) county is the first to instruct delegates to the convention to vote for Palmer for president.

Hester's Weekly Report.

NEW ORLEANS, March 5.—Secretary Hester's New Orleans cotton crop report shows another heavy movement for market during the past week, it being 15,723 bales more than the corresponding period ending March 4 last year. This makes the excess for the first four days of March 27,020 more than last season, bringing the cotton marketed to date to 460,373 bales over the corresponding date last year. The total movements of the crop into sight for the week is 141,407 bales against 125,764 from Feb. 27 to March 4 inclusive last year. The quantity marketed for the first four days of March was 68,834 bales against 66,132 last year. These bring the total quantity of the cotton crop marketed to date to 7,988,788 bales, against 7,526,415. The movement from Sept. 1 to March 4, including total receipts at all United States ports was 6,164,415 bales against 5,876,267 last year. The overland movement to American mills by railroads crossing the Mississippi, Potomac and Ohio rivers was 1,008,388, against 884,491. Interior stocks in excess of those held at the close of the previous season are 432,119, against 383,306, and all southern mill takings, exclusive of the quantity consumed at southern ports, were 331,106, against 282,361. The total takings of American mills north and south thus far for the season of 1891-92 have been 3,140,641, against 2,048,590 last year. These include 1,747,418 by northern spinners, against 1,646,898. Including stocks left over at the ports and interior towns from the last crop and the number of bales brought into sight thus far of the new crop the supply to date is 8,263,164, against 7,598,357 bales for the same period last year.
