THE FIVE DOLLAR RATE.
Chairman Thruston Explains the
Arrangements for Confederate
Excursion.

DALLAS, Texas, March 3 1892.
 To the Commanders of the different Camps of
 the Ex-Confederate Veterans of the State of
 Texas.

There seems to be some misunder-
 standing in regard to the \$5 00 rate to
 New Orleans and return. In explana-
 tion we wish to say, the \$5 00
 rate is not made by the railroad, but
 by the executive committee having in
 charge the excursion. This commit-
 tee charts the train and furnishes
 the tickets to the delegates. All
 members of visiting camps who will
 enroll themselves as members of the
 state encampment will be delegates
 from Texas to New Orleans and en-
 titled to the \$5 00 rate. Call especial
 attention of the comrades of your
 camp to the fact that the rate will be
 given only to those attending the
 state encampment at Dallas on April
 5th, and tickets sold on this rate will
 be honored only on excursion trains
 under control of the committee.

Arrangements have been made for
 a \$15.30 rate on all trains for all per-
 sons, whether delegates or not—who
 may wish to avail themselves of this
 opportunity, and the committee hope
 all friendly to the cause will encour-
 age us by their presence, both at Dal-
 las and New Orleans.

IT CHANGES OWNERS.
The "Manufacturers' Record" Sold
by the Messrs. Edmonds.

It was announced yesterday that
 Messrs. Richard H. Edmonds and
 William H. Edmonds, the owners of

 Thomas P. Grasty, of Baltimore, and

 with Southern developments. The

A SHOOTING SCRAPE.

Silas Ford Slightly Wounded by
William Lockwood.

A difficulty occurred last Saturday
 evening in the back room of S. B.
 Harris' saloon in East Waco between
 William Lockwood and Silas Ford,
 both colored, which narrowly escaped
 serious results. Several negroes were
 playing dominoes when a dispute
 arose, between the parties named, over
 the game.

Lockwood struck Ford over the
 head with a chair and knocked him
 down and as he arose stabbed him in
 the head with a knife. Lockwood
 then ran out and procuring a pistol
 returned and fired at Ford, the ball
 striking him in the left cheek felling
 him to the floor. Lockwood then
 fired another shot and went out on
 the sidewalk waving the pistol over
 his head and said that he had killed
 Silas.

Policeman Hardwick hastened to
 the scene and as he approached Lock-
 wood was told by him he had killed
 Silas and asked not to come there.
 He said also that he had intended to
 kill Silas Ford for some time past and
 had got him. Mr. Hardwick did not,
 however, heed the warning not to
 come to him but promptly made the
 arrest and turned him over to Sheriff
 Dan Ford who locked him up in the
 county jail to await the action of the
 grand jury now in session.

The wounded man is doing well
 and is not thought to be dangerously
 hurt.
