YOUNG JIM BLAINE
 THINKING SERIOUSLY OF WEDDING
 MISS PATTEN,

A Wealthy Orphan, Who Is Well Known in
 New York, Washington and St. Louis—
 The Young Lady's Father Was a Califor-
 nia Miner.

NEW YORK, March 8.—Following close
 upon Secretary Blaine's vigorous defense
 of his wife and son comes the report
 from Washington that James G. Blaine,
 Jr., is ambitious of marrying again. The
 object of his attentions is one of the
 Misses Patten, wealthy orphans, who
 are well known in New York, Washing-
 ton and St. Louis. "The Patten girls,"
 as they are commonly known, are very
 rich. Their father was a California
 miner who left his widow a fortune.
 Nature had given her an emphatic
 brogue, and her origin was lowly. But
 she had ambition for her daughters and
 for herself; so she took her brood to
 France and began with them an educa-
 tional course, in which she was the most
 earnest pupil. She did not improve the
 brogue, but she gained a great deal of
 useful elementary knowledge at the con-
 vent, so that, when she left it, she was
 not ashamed to go into the fashionable
 world.

Society received her cordially. She
 made her home in Washington, where
 she built a beautiful house on Massachu-
 setts avenue. She had a good business
 head, and she did not squander any of
 her husband's fortune. Instead she in-
 creased it materially, so that when she
 died, three or four years ago, she left
 fortunes to all of her daughters. One
 of them during her lifetime married
 John M. Glover, at that time a repre-
 sentative in congress from St. Louis.
 The wedding was a very gorgeous affair.
 Not long after this Mrs. Patten fur-
 nished her son-in-law money with which
 to make the race for governor of Mis-
 souri, but though he spent with a lavish
 hand, he was never heard of in the
 nominating convention. After Mrs.
 Patten's death there was a dispute among
 the heirs over the money which had
 been advanced to Glover. The Patten
 girls drive a stylish cart about Wash-
 ington, dress handsomely and attract a
 great deal of attention. A Blaine alli-
 ance with the Patten family would not
 create much surprise. Young Blaine
 has never been self-supporting. He has
 been dependent all his life on the friends
 of his father for salaried positions,
 which did not demand much ability. He
 is not popular or bright, and he does not
 seem likely to make another match on
 his merits. If he can change the Blaine
 name and prestige for a fortune, he will
 make himself at least financially inde-
 pendent of his father.

Result of a Compromising Situation.

NEW YORK, March 8.—Mrs. Kate
 Scanlan died in a New York hospital,
 the victim of her jealous husband's rage
 and his outraged feelings. Richard
 Scanlan went home and alleged he found
 his wife in a compromising situation
 with his own brother, Michael Scanlan.
 A vigorous quarrel ensued and harsh
 words followed, until, rendered almost
 insane, the husband dashed a lighted
 lamp from the table and hurled it at
 his wife. The lamp struck the woman
 under the left eye and knocked her to
 the floor. In a moment she was a blazing
 bundle and, regaining her feet, ran
 shrieking to the street, where the police
 caught her and carried her to a neigh-
 boring house. She was horribly burned
 on every part of her body and six hours
 later died in terrible agony. The hus-
 band was found some hours later in
 hiding. He acknowledged he threw the
 lamp which caused his wife's horrible
 death.

As Man and Wife.

VALPARAISO, Ind., March 8.—A couple
 by the name of John McIndeer and wife
 registered at the Sheridan Hotel, South
 Bend. A few hours later they were
 taken in custody by an officer from Bat-
 tle Creek, Mich., who was armed with
 requisition papers for their arrest. The
 alleged Mrs. McIndeer, it transpired, is
 the wife of C. W. Spinner, a business
 man of Battle Creek, who will now ap-
 ply for a divorce from his unfaithful
 spouse. McIndeer, who claims to be the
 representative of a St. Louis wholesale
 house, will be prosecuted to the extent
 of the law.

 bourbon, twenty drops in water sweet-
 ened with glycerine forming a dose,
 taken four times a day. In addition
 each patient has an inhaler of the doc-
 tor's design. Three months' treatment,
 Dr. Amick claims, will suffice to estab-
 lish a thorough cure in all save heredi-
 tary cases, which are more tedious.
 Says the doctor:

"No sane person will suppose that any
 treatment will cure a given disease after
 it has passed a certain limit. Consump-
 tion is no exception. One grand feature
 with this treatment is that it is not dan-
 gerous, and there are no risks to run,
 as in the dangerous Koch inocula-
 tions."

A Wealthy Man Waylaid Folks.

SPRINGFIELD, O., March 8.—A persis-
 tent pursuit after a desperate criminal
 has resulted in bringing to light a queer
 phase in the character of a well known
 citizen here. For some weeks citizens
 have been living in constant terror of
 some one who, lying in wait for passers-
 by, seemed to take fiendish delight in
 clubbing them with a heavy iron rod.
 Attempts to capture or identify him
 were all baffled.

James Curry saw a figure which an-
 swered to the description of the man
 slinking along the street and the shadow
 of a fence. He gave the alarm and
 headed a party to capture the fel-
 low. Mr. Curry soon caught up with
 the man, when the latter turned and
 knocked him down with a tremendous
 blow, then rushed toward the open
 country. The pursuers chased him for a
 long distance, and gradually gained on
 him. He suddenly stopped and rushed
 toward them with a short club. So ter-
 rible was his appearance the whole
 crowd turned and ran. The man then
