Attend the Clark club meeting to-night at the court house.

Chas. Roberts and M. M. Marman were tried in the city court this morning and fined \$5 each for intoxication.

Thirteen indictments were returned into the district court by the grand jury yesterday evening, nine of which were for misdemeanors and four for felonies.

Jake Wiggins, the well known hackman has been confined to his bed several days and has been unable to attend to the many calls that are made for him in person.

There will be a meeting of the Triple Alliance at the parlors of the Waverly hotel tomorrow night. Business of importance will be transacted requiring the attendance of all the members.

The grand jury having returned an indictment against Mr. O. W. Buck for the killing of Charles Fowler, he was re-arrested and required to give bond again. The bond in this instance was fixed by Judge Goodrich at \$1,000, which Mr. Buck gave readily with ten good citizens of Waco as sureties. It will be remembered that Mr. Bucks first bond before the Mr. Fowler died was placed at \$5,000. At the habeas corpus trial it was placed at \$3,500 by Judge Gallagher. Now after indictment it is fixed at \$1,000.

WACO THE GEYSER CITY.

WHY IS IT SO CALLED—SOME INTERESTING DATA FROM

Col. Pope's "Waco Geyser"—We clip the following from The Waco Geyser Published Recently By Col. S. H. Pope, Secretary of The Waco Board of Trade.

"Why is Waco called the Geyser City of Texas? Because of its artesian wells and phenomenal heat of their waters.

Why is Waco the Geyser City of America? It has the greatest number of overflowing wells of any city on this continent, and can show a well, whose daily output, initial pressure and heat exceed that of any in America or Europe.

The first well overflowed March 10, 1889 and the sixteenth was developed February 13, 1892. Neither has affected the flow of the other. The minimum distance apart is feet, the maximum is four miles. Fifty minimum diameter is six inches; maximum ten inches; minimum depth, 1708 feet, maximum, 1865 feet, mean, 1810 feet. Minimum temperature, 96 degrees F., maximum, 106 degrees F., mean, 103 degrees F. Minimum initial pressure to the square inch, 40 pounds; maximum, 85 pounds; mean, 60 pounds. Minimum daily output, 200,000 gallons, maximum, 2,500,000 gallons; mean, 600,000 gallons.

ANALYSIS.

Silica, 1,3456; Alumina, trace; Iron Sesquioxide, 1.493; Sodium Chloride, 6.0267; Sodium and Potassium Sulphates, 23.9583; Sodium Carbonate, and Bi-Carbonate, 20.6587; Calcium Sulphate, .0000; Calcium Carbonate 1.1579; Magnesium Carbonate, .8432. Total solids by calculation, 53.8201.

Probably no event of such far reaching effect has occurred, in the history of Waco, as the discovery of hot water and the development of a number of artesian wells, phenomenal in heat, output and initial pressure.

Captain J. D. Bell, with an unusual display of perseverance and commendable zeal, tapped the hot reservoir 1,830 feet below the surface and the crystal fluid gushed forth in large volumes. His unexpected success inspired confidence, others followed suit and to-day Waco can boast of sixteen overflowing artesian wells, the most remarkable on two continents. The water is soft and almost chemically pure, the minerals held in suspension are imperceptible and without taste. It is used for mechanical and domestic purposes. It possesses remedial properties equal to any of the thermal springs of America.

Judgments of \$20,400 have been filed in New York against the Mexican and Monterey railroad.

The report is once more abroad that the sugar trust has gobbled up the Spreckles plant at Philadelphia.

Miss Belle Davis of Ware, Mass., niece of the director-general of the World's fair, eloped with her father's hired man.

The steamer Guiding Star caught fire on the Mississippi above Vicksburg. Little damage done. Mrs. Belle Shadinger of Cincinnati was scared to death.

The committee of the New York senate appointed to investigate the Reading deal reported that the transaction was eminently regular, but at the request of coal dealers the committee was continued.
