CLOSING HOURS.

The Extra Session Winding up its Business.

THE HOGG HOUSE AND ANTI-HOGG

Senate Indulge in Parting Kicks, the First Coming from the Hogg House and Returned with Interest by the Anti-Hogg Senate—The Hogg Men Play the Baby Act on the International Investigation—Preparing for a Banquet.

AUSTIN, April 12.—Colonel Gerald finally managed to force the administration members to show their hands on the International receivership question. He called it up the first thing this morning and the baby act was played in great shape. Breitz, one of the committeemen who had charge of the investigation, wanted the matter postponed. This was no surprise as he had only impressed his numerical identity upon the investigation, it was but natural that he wanted to get rid in some summary manner a question that was so complicated to him.

Doggett, the member who has so recently declared that he came down to Austin this session a Clark man, but has become converted, thought that the members had not had time to read up on the investigation record and therefore should not take up so grave a matter in great haste. He said this notwithstanding the printed record has been on the tables of the members for three weeks. This was the baby talk that they indulged in and it was really pitiable. It was the best way and the administration minors thought that the anti had forgotten that such a question was pending. Colonel Gerald could not hope to hear the minority report adopted, but he simply wanted to know how to class a body of men, numbering 106, separating the honest and faithful from those who if honest were to be charitable very weak in principle, though strong in allegiance to their master, the chief executive. Of all the matters that have come up during this extra session, this, perhaps, is the greatest deadener to the Hogg crowd, a fit companion to the Saturday night fiasco, which was reported to be a great rally of Hogg and commission men.

The most exciting scene of the session in the senate was occasioned today by the reading of a resolution from the house, in which it undertook to accuse the senate of trying to destroy the effective power of the railroad commission. Carter made a strong speech, in which he upheld the dignity and honesty of the senate, and thought the action of the house was calculated to disrupt the Democratic party. Simpkins in a patronizing manner that would have done credit to a father advising a wayward son, said that he hoped the senators would not act rashly, but go very coolly to work and take some nampamby action. These senators who were disposed to resent the insult advised the sending of it back without comments. After a heated discussion in which the administration crowd were terribly anxious and frightened, the resolution was simply laid on the table. The discussion showed very plainly that the senate has a good majority for an elective commission.

There was great hurrying to and

fro between the two houses in order to get everything through in perfect shape before adjournment and the near approach of the close of the session had a tendency to demoralize everybody more or less.

Just before 7 o'clock the governor sent in his final message calling attention to the measures that had received his signature and wishing the Hogg legislature a merry time. The senate and house adjourned almost simultaneously at 7 o'clock p. m., and tonight as many of the members with all the press will eat and drink heartily and merrily at the expense of Fort Worth and Austin, two of the fortunate candidates for two of the courts of appeals. It is safe to predict that as far as heads are concerned there will be more tomorrow morning that will acknowledge that they were banqueted than in actual numbers will be present tonight, in other words the sparkling wine will put heads upon them that will be large and swelled, but it all goes in Austin, when the boys are turned loose.

AWAY WENT GILPIN.

A Narrow Escape From Serious Injury in a Runaway.

A well known gentleman and young lady were out driving last Sunday afternoon on South Third street, when their horse became unmanageable and dashed off at a rapid rate. Charley was thrown violently from the buggy, but the young lady bravely retained her seat while the maddened animal continued its flight till the bridge over Waco creek was reached. The vehicle then came in contact with the railing with a tremendous crash, throwing the young lady out and over into the turbid stream went horse and buggy, all in a heap. A negro man caught the horse and resurrounded it safe and sound from the abyss. By this time Mr. B. came up at a 2:40 gait and after taking a retrospective view of the situation and pronouncing silent benedictions upon the violent brute he determined he would not be outdone. With the help of the negro the buggy was patched up and the two took their seats behind the vicious animal, which had apparently become as docile as a lamb. The word was given and "away went Gilpin" like a flash, and clatter-bang went his heels at every jump as long as there was enough buggy left to kick at.
