MICHIGAN FOR ALGER.

The State Republican Convention Resolves that he is its Choice for the Presidency.

DETROIT, Mich., April 14.—The Republicans of Michigan in convention assembled in this city today adopted with much enthusiasm and unanimity a resolution offered by Hon. R. M. Duffield, nominating General Russell A. Alger, as a presidential candidate. Following is the resolution:

Resolved, That we commend administration of President Harrison as conspicuously able and pure and wise. It adds another proof of the safety of the country when its affairs are managed by the Republican party.

Resolved, That the Republicans of Michigan, desiring only the success of the party which saved the Union and renewing their pledge and loyalty to both its principles and its candidates, and recognizing the great worth and strong availability of their generous and noble hearted fellow citizen, that gallant soldier and statesman that friend of the poor and successful man of business General Russell A. Alger (cheers) do hereby unanimously and most earnestly recommend him to the Republican national convention at Minneapolis as their nominee for president believing that his nomination if made will lead to a glorious Republican victory. THE SUGAR BOUNTY.

A Sugar Planter Who Lives in San Antonio.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Captain Ed Cunningham of San Antonio, Texas, the largest sugar planter in that state, who is here looking after the situation relative to sugar bounty funds, said that while the bill will likely pass the house it is sure to be turned down in the senate. He says what sugar growers need more than anything else is assurance of a permanent system. I don't claim that bounty now given us is better than the old duty levied on imported sugar but we are getting along prosperously under the present law and there is profit in the business. If congress will only let present statutes remain undisturbed. It is the fear of changes in the law that hurts planters. Southern Texas is one of the finest regions on earth for growing sugar cane. There are a million acres in that section as good as, or better, than any in Louisiana that could profitably be developed to the production of that crop. It would be a great thing if our people would stop raising so much cotton yet there has been no reduction in the acreage of cotton in Texas this year. The only way out of the trouble is for grangers to raise more grain, meat and cattle and make cotton their surplus crop.

A NEW DEPARTURE.

The Olympic Club Will Have Three Fights in One Week.

NEW ORLEANS, April 14.—The Olympic club has started a project of dimensions more gigantic than any ever attempted by a pugilistic club. It has already offered \$25,000 for Sullivan and Corbett on September 7th. It now proposes to give \$10,000 for Fitzsimmons and Hall and \$10,000 for Meyer and McAuliffe. Three fights will take place in one week. The week's transactions are expected to overcome any charms that races, business or other engagements may have for sporting people and bring at least five thousand strangers to the city. The plan was suggested by some of the leading railroads throughout the country, who propose to attach fight tickets to excursion tickets, so that the purchasers will be sure of a seat before he reaches New Orleans.

A SHERIFF ABSCONDS.

A Defaulter in \$10,000—Gambled in Futures—Gone to South America.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 14.—Thomas M. Grant, chief deputy sheriff of Shelby county, and acting sheriff, has absconded. He left Saturday and to-day his wife received a letter dated New Orleans giving the first news that he was a defaulter. He said he had fled as the only alternative to keep out of the penitentiary and was then on the eve of sailing for South America. He had spent about \$10,000 of other people's money. He was administrator of a number of estates and was general manager of the Colorado Land Company. The money he made away with belonged to the Evans estates and plaintiffs in court for whom he had levied executions. It went in gambling in futures.

ASTOLEN CHILD.

The Son of a Wealthy Man Kidnapped by Tramps, but is Recovered.

ANNISTON, Ala., April 14.—The eight year old son of Jos. Swayne, a wealthy resident, was stolen from his home by tramps yesterday afternoon. The little fellow was carried into the mountains east of this city where he was found unconscious by some hunters later on. He had been badly beaten and was tied to a tree. No trace of kidnapper has been found. It is believed the child was stolen with a view of obtaining a ransom.

A COMPLETE VICTORY.

The Street Car Drivers in New Orleans Strike and Win.

NEW ORLEANS, April 14.—New Orleans was threatened with a tie up of all its street car lines this morning. Yesterday a grievance committee from the drivers union presented a demand to all lines for \$1.65 per day, present salary, for twelve hours consecutive work, and pay for all extra work. They have been working sixteen and eighteen hours a day. This morning the street railway company offered to increase their pay \$5 per month providing the drivers would continue to work sixteen hours. This they promptly refused. Addresses were made by the railroad officials to drivers assembled at their hall, but they held out. At 1 o'clock this afternoon all the railway companies acceded to their demands, signing an agreement which will remain in effect one year.
