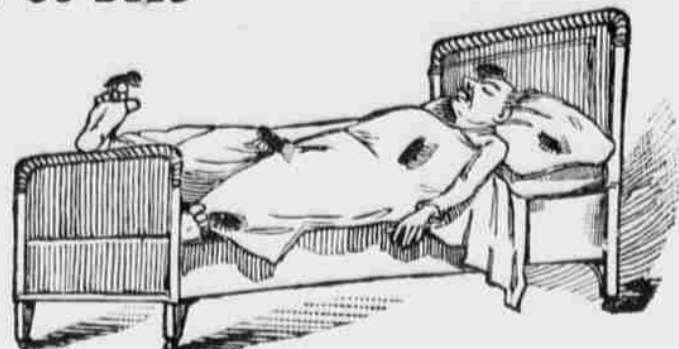
**Parrott Takes Charge.**
