ANOTHER MURDER.

One Negro Kills Another Near Harrison.

ALL ABOUT A FAITHLESS WIFE.

Fleming Estell Debauches the Home of Tom Weidamyer and His Life Pays the Penalty—Full Particulars of the Killing—No Surprise to Those Who Knew the two Men.

Another murder was committed this morning, and the colored citizens around Harrison station are in a state of intense excitement. Fleming Estell was shot down by Tom Weidamyer. Both are colored men and were tenants on the Harrison farm near Harrison station. The killing was not unexpected. For months Tom Weidamyer has protested against the frequent visits of Estell at his house and his intimacy with his wife. He has talked with his white friends about it time and again and in complaining of the trouble between himself and Estell he always said he was forced on account of his children to remain at home with his wife whom he knew was untrue to him and he was determined to keep Estell away. Every effort, however, failed. Estell continued his visits every opportunity, he had and finally Weidamyer went to Estell and told him that if he ever caught him in his house again he would kill him. A short time after this Estell, it is said, waylaid Weidamyer in the field one day and cursed and abused him, holding in the mean time a six shooter leveled at him. Weidamyer was unarmed and could not be provoked into a difficulty, which he knew would end in his death, so the matter passed off without serious trouble at that time.

One day last week Estell was seen by Weidamyer leaving his house just as he was approaching from the field and arming himself, Weidamyer followed, Estell eluded him at that time and the killing did not take place until this morning.

NOT YET DEAD.

The details of the difficulty this morning, which from later accounts has not yet proven fatal to the wounded man, are as follows:

Tom Weidamyer went to the field this morning to work, as usual, and upon returning to the house found Estelle there. As soon as Estelle saw him he put his hand in his bosom and pulled his pistol, but before he could use it, Tom fired and shot off three of the fingers of the hand in which he held the pistol. Four more shots were fired in quick succession, one taking effect in the right arm, one in the left arm, and one in the left breast just below the heart. Five shots were fired, one of which did not take effect. Tom immediately surrendered to Mr. W. H. Abbott, the manager of the John H. Harrison farm and Mr. Henry Ashburn, the merchant at Harrison. They started to town with him, but before they arrived here met Deputy Sheriff Tom Madden to whom they turned over the prisoner. An examining trial will be had tomorrow and it is thought the offense clearly a case of justifiable homicide. The amount of bail required will doubtless be small. Estelle is not yet dead, but it is thought he cannot recover.

The weapons used are in the possession of the officers. The one used by Weidamyer is a .44 calibre Remington, and that of Estelle, which is stained with his blood, is a .38 Smith and Wesson.
