If the farmer's land was worth \$5 per acre before the railroad was built and a few years after is worth \$50 per acre has not the property of the railroad increased in value in exactly the same proportion? Then if the railroad was worth \$10,000 a mile when first built it would be \$100,000 a mile when the farmer's \$5 land got to be worth \$50. The man who bought land on the prairies at \$5 per acre and after a railroad is built by it comes to town and mortgages it for \$25 per acre "waters his stock" just as much as does the railroad that mortgages the road for five times its cost. There are two sides to all questions.

**ARRAIGNMENT OF THE DAILY PRESS.**

Governor Hogg said to a Dallas News reporter at Denison the other day:

"Young man, if you are going along with me on this canvass I want you to share all its joys and pleasures with me and above all I want you to tell the truth. The daily papers of this state are not supporting me, but I am not complaining about that. I suppose they are here for business and know where the best picking is. I have no daily organ; so my friends in the various towns I will visit have been requested whenever The News makes a false statement to load it up with denials. There is the only recourse I have and the only protection I have. A fair reporter is welcome at my appointments, but I do not want them to send a professional liar around."

The insinuation that the daily papers who support Clark are hired to do it is slander of a kind which never emanates from any other but a coarse, cankerous brain. It is very natural, however, for a man who has exhibited all the elements of a first class blackmailer to attribute to others mercenary motives. He feels the power of the daily press of Texas and he seeks, by the infamous methods of the slanderer, to soften the blows he is receiving at its hands daily. The daily paper lives on the growth and prosperity of the city and country around it. It will thrive only when the people around it thrives, will prosper only when they prosper. When business is dull the daily paper is the first institution to feel it, when hard times come the first to suffer is the daily paper. Is it any wonder then that the daily press of Texas are a unite in opposition to the present administration when the management of every one of the dailies knows it is the attitude of the Hogg administration toward capital that has brought stagnation to every business and thrown a dark mantle of commercial gloom over the entire state. The daily papers want prosperity something they know will never again visit Texas until Hogg is no more. That is why they are not supporting Hogg. The scheme Gov. Hogg has adopted for the purpose of bulldozing the News reporters is an evidence of an abiding distrust of himself and he proposes to deny anything reported as coming from him if it proves a boomerang. The denying racket has been worked by the Tyler gang but it was not altogether satisfactory. There happened to be honest men enough on hand to prove the truth of the first report. It is hoped the News reporters will provide for substantiating their reports and if Hogg makes a bad break fasten it upon him.


