ALL OVER TOWN

A tremendous crowd attended the Decoration Day exercises today.

Robt. Rodgers, a negro who had escaped from the county convict farm, was re-captured and jailed today.

The Juvenile Cavalry made a splendid appearance in the parade this afternoon, as did also the Baylor cadets

Today was real estate sale day and Sheriff Ford and his deputies auctioned off quite a number of tracts of land.

The Decoration Day parade this afternoon was an even mile long after the young ladies joined the procession. It was by far the longest Decoration Day parade ever seen in Waco.

Waco today reminds us of Sunday. About 1500 people went to Cameron to save their country and about 2000 are engaged in honoring the heroes who died in defense of their country.

A News reporter is indebted to Mr. John Moore for a Confederate bill with "In Memoriam" printed on the back. The poem appears in today's issue of THE NEWS at the conclusion of the report of Decoration Day proceedings.

One of the business crossing in the city is the corner of Fourth and Austin streets and yet it is one of the darkest places in the city at night. The city should by all means place an arc light at this corner. One should also be placed at the corner of Fifth and Austin.

Mr. Westbrook asked THE NEWS to announce that there would be plenty of bread and meat at the barbecue and ladies and gentlemen going out from Waco can have all they want. But, if they will take a basket of nice things out with them they will find the loveliest place on earth to eat them supplemented of course by barbecued meat and bakers bread.

This morning a boy giving his name as John Lewis, Jr., applied to Officer Kendrick for assistance in finding his parents. He says his parents lived in Ennis until a short time ago and left for Waco, leaving him behind. He was to come when sent for. A few days ago, he was written to come and expected to meet his parents at the depot, but has been unable to find them so far. He got here yesterday.

Friday is the day for the Lorena barbecue. The Lorena people will furnish all the meats, bread and pickles necessary to feed 5000 people. There are several families going from Waco taking their baskets along filled with dainties, and if they do they can just have a lovely time. Roast meat and bread and pickles will be furnished in abundance.

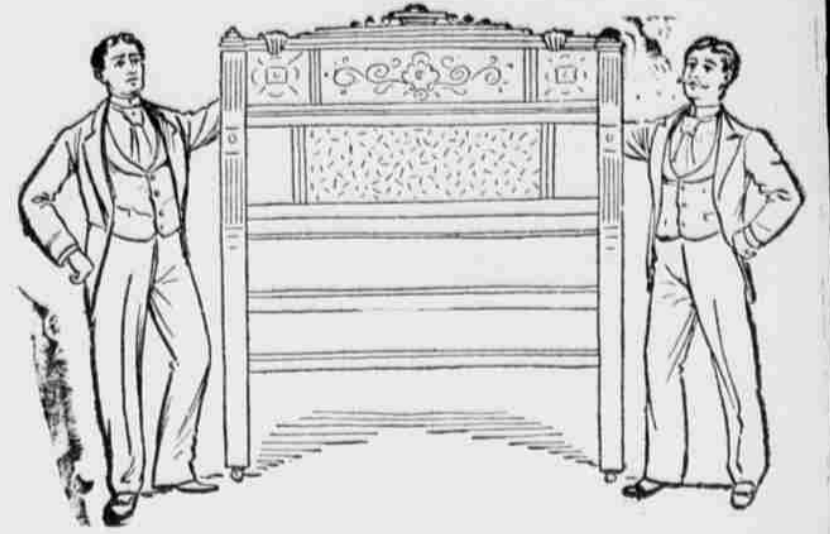

He utterly fails to give any account of himself at the time of the murder or at any time since except that he worked three days for Mr. Matson near Hubbard City last week. The officers are positive that they have one of the men wanted.
