PRIMARY CONVENTIONS

NAMES OF THE CHAIRMEN IN PRECINCT NO. 1.

General Instruction to the Chairmen as to the Test Adopted by the Executive Committee.

In conformity with a resolution adopted at a session of the Democratic Executive Committee held in Waco May 2nd 1892, a full report of which appeared in the WACO EVENING NEWS of that date and the Waco Day May 3rd 1892. We hereby appoint the following chairmen to preside at the Democratic mass meetings at the places here designated on May 7th.

- First ward, R J Goode, City Hall.
- Second ward, Clarence Hubby, Engine House, Twelfth street.
- Third ward, Layton F Puckette, Padgett's Park.
- Fourth ward, Jno Falls, Court house.
- Fifth ward, Jno M McGhee, Engine House.
- Poor House, H A McGhee.
- Hortons residence, Horton.
- White hall, B J Kendrick.
- Hewitt, B G Wheeler, Womacks store.
- Daughtreys dairy, D R Gurley.
- Rosenthal, Buck Jackson.
- Robinson, Rice Wilkerson.

The Democratic voters were requested at a meeting of the Democratic Executive Committee April 2 to meet on Saturday May 7th. At a subsequent meeting May 2nd a resolution was adopted providing that each member of the executive committee select a chairman at the different polling places to preside over the meeting. The resolution further provided "That said chairmen are hereby required to exclude from participating in said mass meeting all parties who will not give the pledges adopted by the committee this day.

It was believed that the appointment in this way of chairmen who had a wide acquaintance in their precincts would have a beneficial effect in keeping out parties who are not true Democrats. This much is necessary in justice to the committee in adopting the unusual course of appointing chairmen for mass meetings, when the custom has been for the meetings to select their own chairmen. These chairmen will then see as far as possible that no parties vote who are not now Democrats of unquestioned fealty; unless a person who has affiliated with other parties heretofore, or whose democracy the chairman knows to be doubtful will give the pledges required by the executive committee on said May 2." Those pledges substantially were that a party desiring to vote must renounce his allegiance to all parties but the Democratic party and pledge his support to all nominees of said party. The party must also reside in the ward or voting precinct, and if the chairman does not know this of his own knowledge he must be vouched for by some reputable person known to the chairmen. I would advise chairmen to procure copies of the papers of dates mentioned above.

Those meetings are called to select delegates to a county convention to be held May 14, which said convention will elect delegates to a congressional convention and to the Lampasas convention. This last will elect delegates to the national convention. The ward and precinct meetings can send delegates in any number the Democrats may determine upon, but this will give them no greater representation in said convention.

The chairmen will call their respective meetings to order at 8:30 o'clock p. m. on date before mentioned, to wit: Saturday, May 7th.
