THE SITUATION DEMANDS CLARK.

here are some good Democrats in as who oppose Judge Clark because his election being considered a complete reversal of the policy which was adopted only two years ago would mean a complete revolution of the political sentiment that the people would feel humiliated at their own present fickleness. There is good reason to believe that a large majority of the people are held to the political opinions of the governor by no other means whatever. It is pertinent then to inquire, to what element in the Democratic party is due the election of Governor Hogg, and what proportion of the party does this element constitute, taking their own history and history of their opponents as a guide. There has been in the Democratic party for years a dissatisfied, turbulent class. They made themselves felt when the Greenback craze struck us, and some of our most prominent men were driven to heed the clamor and take up their false and dangerous theory as their own. They took the bravest hearts and coolest heads in the party to prevent its capture by the Greenbackers before they went into an organization of their own. Their next move was the war on railroads inaugurated by the same class which had been defeated in the Greenback movement and they kept hammering away organizing into first one political party and another worked the Alliance to death and finally they observed a tendency among the Democrat leaders, such as Terrell, to adopt their views and they then set about planning a way to capture the Democratic party. When Terrell and a few others began preaching the gospel of the new Democracy, the old line straight laced warriors protested feebly, but the howl had been so incessant for years that most of them concluded to hands off and allow the "reformers" to work out the salvation of the county by the new lightning process. In 1890, Hogg having won fame as a railroad prosecutor, while attorney general, mounted the wave of popular clamor and was triumphantly elected governor. It was the result of the agitation carried on by this turbulent element in the party for years and years and those who did not allow themselves to be pulled into it were silent and inactive, allowing the election to go by default. These latter believed the election of Hogg would be disastrous, but they did not know it. They have had two years of Hogg now and they know their former opinion is correct. To the charge that Hogg and his followers were trying to confiscate the railroad property of the state the answer was made that no such desire lurked anywhere in a Hogg man's bosom, so, being always in favor of some sort of regulation the commission was accepted as the best method and the machine was turned over to the governor. People at once lost faith in Texas. Hogg's evident hostility to all capital and especially that incorporated, was regarded as not only an invitation to foreign capital to stay away, but a menace to that already invested here. It is absolutely necessary for this prejudice against Texas to be removed. Will the re-election of Gov. Hogg do it? No. Will the nomination of a dark horse do it? No. The policy adopted and maintained by the administration has convinced capital that investments are not safe in Texas. To destroy that prejudice we must nominate a man who has fought the ad-

ministration in its meanderings, and has now placed it on the defensive. The nomination will have its effect immediately and while the policy favored by the majority of the people two years ago, will be maintained the attitude of the state government will be reversed and confidence restored. It is not necessary to enumerate the acts of Governor Hogg which have engendered the feeling of distrust now prevalent abroad. His relentless prosecution of the railroads upon insufficient grounds, his recommendation and approval of the alien land law of 1890 added to the almost constant abuse of all corporations indulged in by the governor, are enough in themselves to produce a panic. These and other things have frightened capital away from our state. Before it will return here for investments we must not only defeat Mr. Hogg, but must nominate and elect a man who publicly declares against the policies which have governed the administration. A compromise man will not benefit us. George Clark is the only man who will answer the full measure of the requirement. It will not be a revolution of sentiment with those only who supported Hogg before, and afterwards were chagrined at his gross mistakes. All Democrats should get together and demand Clark and confidence will come.

SCRATCH IT OUT. SCRATCH IT OUT.

Governor Hogg said if the school money was loaned to the people the state would be cheated. He also yelled to the reporter: "Scratch that out, scratch it out." Terrell said in effect, that Ross "joked with principle," and the Hogg literary bureau proceeded to scratch that out too. Hogg said to the Twenty-first legislature: "Give me a trust law as long as my finger and I will control the corporations in Texas, and we won't need any commission." He wants that scratched out. This is a gross violation of the cherished principle of local self government. He advocates the loaning of the school money to short line railroads in this state one of the most unsafe investments that could be made. He makes a vicious attack in every speech upon all corporations when we all know it is impossible to carry on business in all its branches in this country without incorporating. In his mad career of demagoguery he has frightened away investments and left Texas stranded in the midst of lavish promise and her prosperity is threatened for years to come. It is not necessary to particularize. Hogg's administration and Hogg's campaign if successful will kill Texas, that's all.

The Gate City Daily Graphic of Texarkana heads an editorial with the name "George Clark" and proceeds as follows:

"After a patient pause and a diligent scanning of coming events, we announce today our support of the distinguished gentleman for governor of Texas, whose name heads this article. Measured by any measure, weighed in any scales, subjected to any test that measures a governor or makes a patriot, George Clark fills

the bill of public necessity; sober, learned and patriotic, he comes to us as another Moses to lead this people out of the "slough of despond." "Turn Texas loose," is the slogan of the campaign. That is the necessity of the hour; let the people respond in glad and unanimous and the young giant will march to that greatness that God ordained. Emancipated in her strides by the Hogg dynasty, capital forbidden to enter her vast domains; vicious legislation advised and demanded by Hogg, the state is now cabled to the ear of the demagogues who fooled the people into his preferment. But the day of reckoning may not always be the next day, but it is ever sure to be at the next election. This is now the situation and Hogg and his Tyler gang of railroad wreckers, will be taught a lesson, that the people are omnipotent in matters that pertain to their interest and will vindicate at the ballot-box the right, duty and privilege of so declaring.

Hogg will be elected "when the pigs begin to fly."
