BANKERS MEETING

The Financiers of Texas in Session in Waco.

INTERESTING PAPERS READ

Prominent Visitors Speak and the Discussion is Lively

ON IMPORTANT QUESTIONS.

Officers to be Elected and the Plan Fixed—A Large Assemblage of Representative Citizens, From Every Quarter of TEXAS—General Items of Interest Picked Up by a News Reporter among the Capitalists.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION.

The convention re-convened at 2:30 with nearly a full house in attendance.

The order of the papers was reversed and the paper of President F. B. Gray, of the Citizens' National bank of San Angelo, was read by the secretary as Mr. Gray was unable to be present. The subject of the paper was "Uniformity of Bank Drafts, Checks, Notes, etc."

The paper was listened to with deep attention and was referred to a special committee composed of L. C. Jester of Tyler, W. W. Cheathan of Clarksville and L. B. Black of Waco.

The next paper was read by Cashier A. S. Reed of the Ballinger National bank. The subject of the paper was "Should Bankers' Associations be Encouraged?"

The paper was quite a lengthy one and was listened to with deep attention from beginning to end, and repeatedly applauded.

There was no discussion of the papers.

Mr. J. N. Brown of the Alamo National bank of San Antonio, offered a resolution that the next president of the association correspond with the superintendent of public instruction with the view of getting a short course in national banking inserted in the curriculum in the public schools.

Mr. E. M. Loageope of Lampasas, read a paper bearing directly on the subject.

TODAY'S SESSION.

The second days proceedings of the Texas Bankers association was opened at the city hall this morning by an address by T. J. Groce, Esq., cashier of the Galveston National bank. His subject was "The System of Free collection and its relation to conservative banking." The address—quite a lengthy one was listened to with deep attention from beginning to end. It abounded in wit and humor and was repeatedly applauded.

The next address was on "The relation that should exist between city and country banks," by W. R. Hamby, Esq., cashier American National bank of Austin. The gentleman announced at the beginning of his address that its principal merit would consist of its brevity but there was not a person present but enjoyed the address enough to wish it longer.

The next order of exercises was the discussion of the above subjects. The subject of the relation of city banks with country banks was ably discussed by Cashier A. S. Reed, of the Ballinger National bank, G. A. Levi, of A. Levy & Co's. bank of Victoria, Cashier E. O. Tenison of the State National bank, Dallas.

Mr. W. H. Lee, pres. the Merchants' National bank of St. Louis was introduced and explained the plan which his bank worked under in its relations with country banks. He took occasion in his speech to pay a very high compliment to Texas bankers and banks stating that his bank and a big trust company with which he was connected, desired all the Texas business they could get.

Mr. C. W. Buller, president of the National Bank of the Republic of St. Louis, was next introduced and stated that all of the Texas banks actually do their business through St. Louis, being the nearest point to them, so all arrangements affecting collections should be made in connection with St. Louis. He stated also that he had been coming to Texas for the past

nine years and that he was more favorably impressed with the state each successive year. He made quite a lengthy address which was well received by the audience present and was heartily applauded.

Mr. Calloway of the Metropolitan National bank of Kansas City, was next called for and responded briefly.

Mr. F. N. Chick, second vice-president of the National bank of Kansas City, was next introduced and explained in some length the status of his bank on the relation existing between his bank and its country correspondents.

Mr. G. A. Levi, of Victoria, asked for information whether the chair would appoint a nomination committee or whether the officers would be elected from the floor.

The custom has been to appoint a committee of five to bring in nomination which virtually elects the officers.

Mr. Hilliard of Austin, spoke in favor of an open election.

Mr. Levi arose in defense of the present method.

Mr. L. L. Jester, of Tyler, made a motion that the house go into the election of a nominating committee.

Judge A. P. Woodriddle, of Austin, spoke in favor of the nominating committee. He thought that a committee of five would give more thought to the selection than the individual members.

Mr. Carey Shaw, of Columbus, offered a substitute that the house elect its own officers.

After much discussion it was decided to elect the officers from the floor.

The selection of the place for the holding of the next meeting was made the special order of business for tomorrow at 11 o'clock.

Dr. Burleson extended an invitation to the bankers to visit Baylor university.
