## BANKERS ADJOURN

End of the Eighth Annual Session. Election of Officers Today.

### THE RESOLUTION ADOPTED

Complimentary to Waco and Her Citizens - Interesting Address Officers Elected - Date and Place of the Next Meeting.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The first paper on the programme for the afternoon was by Heber Stone Esq., president of the First National Bank of Brenham on "how is the public affected by a high rate of interest? What is a high rate of interest? It was a splendid paper and the subject was handled in a masterly style.

The second paper on the evenings programme was as interesting if not more so than the first. It was by J. E. Longmoor Esq., cashier of the First National Bank of Rockdale. It touched on a subject of vital importance to every banker in the state suggestions made in the paper elicited a great deal of discussion in which nearly everyone present took part.

The Banker's convention was called to order by Vice-President E. M. Longcope.

Mr. M. A. Sullivan in behalf of the bankers of Waco stated that he understood that some of the visitors intended leaving before the closing exercises to-night and he wishes to serve an injunction against such proceeding.

The only paper on the programme for the morning was "Inequality of Bank Taxations and How to Remedy It" by President A. P. Wooldridge of the City National bank of Austin. The hearing of the paper was set for a later hour on account of the absence of Mr. Wooldridge.

The special committee to which was referred the paper of Mr. F. B. Gray of San Angelo made a report suggesting sizes for drafts.

Mr. A. S. Reed, cashier of the Ballinger National bank arose and spoke as follows:

Mr. President: Allow me to interrupt the proceedings of the convention a moment while I perform a very pleasant duty. It is a well-known fact that the success of all great undertakings is principally achieved by the intelligent direction and unabated zeal of some master mind connected therewith and without such intelligent direction and zeal the undertaking would very likely have proved, if not a failure, at least would not have achieved an abundant success. Recognizing the truism in connection with the eminent service of our agreeable and pleasant secretary, Mr. W. Goodrich Jones and the fact that much of the success of the Texas Banker's association is due to his untiring efforts in our behalf. It is with unfeigned pleasure that I beg to offer him a small testimonial of the appreciation of these services on the part of his friends.

Mr. Jones I tender you this beautiful silver service, and beg you to accept it, not for its intrinsic merit, not for an unmeaning compliment, but as a recognition of your past services and for the zeal and fidelity with which you have uniformly guarded the interest of our much loved institution, The Texas Banker's association. It is sad that it is more blessed to give than to receive. I know this is true, but I believe the payment of an obligation may be attended with very pleasing sensations. The house then went into the election of officers, and while the votes were being counted Mr. F. F. In the election of officers Mr. A. P. Wooldridge of Austin was elected president by a unanimous vote. Mr. E. M. Longcope of Lampasas was elected first vice-president also by an unanimous vote. Mr. T. J. Gioce of Galveston was elected second vice-president, and Mr. A. S. Reed of Ballinger third vice-president. Their election was unanimous, they having no opponents.

phy of Mexia first assistant secretary and Mr. C. F. Smith of McGregor second assistant, Mr. E. O. Tenison was elected treasurer.

The following were elected as the executive committee: F. F. Downs, Temple; W. W. Lipscomb, Luling; J. N. Brown, San Antonio; Otto Steffens, Abilene, H. O. Stern, Galveston.

The following were elected as delegates to the National Bankers association, which meets in San Francisco next September: Heber Stone of Brenham, Ed. Rotan of Waco and J. G. Lawdon of Abilene.

San Antonio was chosen as the place for the meeting of the association next year.

Mr. G. A. Levy arose and offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

Mr. A. P. Wooldridge of Austin arose and explained that he had prepared no paper as was programmed, but would make a short address on "Inequality of Bank Taxation and How to Remedy It." He made a very interesting address which was highly appreciated by the audience.

Mr. Wood of Corsicana offered a resolution to the effect that the authority to issue notes be withdrawn from National banks and that the national government should issue all circulating mediums, also that a committee of three be appointed to consider this matter and to prepare a short address on the subject. No action was taken in the matter.

A communication of Mr. H. W. Wheeler, president of the Commercial National bank of Seattle was received and filed without reading as it was too long and the time of the association was limited.

### THIS AFTERNOON'S SESSION.

The session this afternoon was very brief.

The date of the meeting at San Antonio next year was fixed for May 12, 13 and 14.

A resolution was adopted thanking the American Reporter and its corresponding editor, Mr. B. Singer, for their enterprise in having a reporter at the meetings.

The following resolution was also offered.

Whereas, The bankers and citizens of Waco have been unstinting in the bestowal of hospitalities and courtesies to this association; and

Whereas, Such action on their part has made this convention both in its social and business features one of the most successful and happy of all of our meetings. And
