RINGING RESOLUTIONS PASSED

By the Clark and Elective Commission Club Condemning Hogg and Indorsing Clark—Defense of the Press, the Faithful Guardian of Our Liberties and Brave Defender of Our Rights.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Clark and Elective Commission club at Eagle Pass, Tex., May 11:

Whereas, Texas, the grandest of the Southern states, which under favorable conditions should be the most prosperous of all her sisters, presenting as she does so vast a variety of resources, agricultural, grazing and mining, with a climate unequalled upon the American continent, presenting the finest field in the United States for the profitable investment of capital, and

Whereas, Texas and her most valuable industries are yet in their infancy, and her people are earnestly solicitous that capital and enterprise should be accorded a hearty welcome in our midst, and

Whereas, Through the policy pursued and the measures advocated by our chief executive since his incumbency have been the means of spreading abroad reports damaging in their effect that the people of Texas are antagonistic to foreign and corporate capital and to the railroad interests of the state; and

Whereas, Governor Hogg by his unguarded and incendiary utterances has caused the citizens of Texas to stand before the financial world in the light of communists who are desirous of destroying the property values of railroads which have been induced to come into the state; and

Whereas, He is even now the advocate of a policy so restrictive regarding the building of new roads as will effectually prevent the building of much needed roads in Texas; and

Whereas, His antagonism against alien capital is so extreme that great mining and irrigation enterprises, requiring vast sums of money and of whose development is of vital importance, not only to our prosperity as a community, but to the state at large, therefore be it

Resolved, That in our judgment the re-election of Governor Hogg will of necessity result in the still further prolonging the financial depression under which the state is now suffering for two years more.

That we approve and commend the course adopted by Hon. George Clark in his heroic struggle to relieve the state from the blight of demagoguery which swept over the state two years ago and is still striving to further engulf the state beneath its baleful influences.

That we recognize in his patriotic utterances the ring of true Democracy and indorse his plea for an elective commission, believing that the combined judgment of intelligent and patriotic people in their selection of their public servants is more valuable than the dictum of a governor who appoints his friends to office because he wants to, and is unable to or unwilling to give a better reason for his errors in so doing.

That we declare that the statements made by the enemies of the Hon. George Clark, that his followers are seeking to destroy the commission, is false and utterly without foundation.

That upon the contrary we favor a commission which will effectually protect the people against unjust exactions and extortions by the railway companies, but at the same time we as strongly advocate that justice and fairness shall be meted out to them.

That we recommend the dignified and able manner in which Judge Clark has conducted his campaign.

That we denounce the proposal of Gov. Hogg to loan the children's money to branch roads as being unwise and dangerous in the extreme,

believing that if his ideas are carried out that disaster to the school fund will result.

That we heartily indorse the plan of Hon. George Clark to loan the school funds to the farmers upon their lands at a proper and safe valuation of 5 per cent, believing that such a policy will afford much needed relief to a worthy class of citizens, whose sense of honor and whose honesty is above reproach, and that the security offered, Texas lands at a fair valuation, is the best security in the world.

That we condemn the wholesale denouncement of Gov. Hogg's of the daily papers of the state as untrue and undeserved and unworthy of his high position and a base attack upon the character and standing of a class of citizens who through their enterprise and untiring efforts Texas is indebted for much of her present greatness and material development.

That in his efforts to thus becloud the light which these watchful guardians of the people's rights and liberties have thrown upon his record as a governor, he is thus endeavoring to create a prejudice against this class, but betrays a weakness which springs from a consciousness of gross errors in the administration of state affairs, which the sufferers demand shall be made known to all the people that the wrongs which his mad theories have created may be quickly and effectually remedied and the state restored to its previous condition of peace and prosperity throughout its bounds.

AT THE PARK.

Hon. G. B. Gerald and Judge Julius Schultze Speak.

Pursuant to previous announcement the Sons of Herman and a number of other German-Americans congregated at Padgitt's Park to celebrate the anniversary of the organization.

First upon the programme was an address by Judge G. B. Gerald, candidate for congress.

He was introduced by Mr. W. F. Stolte and made an eloquent speech. He stated that he appeared before the assemblage without preparation, as usual, but hoped he would not bore his audience.

I will have to go back to the past, to my college days, to revive my memory of the past and the history of the noble race I now have the honor to address. I congratulate you upon your citizenship in Texas, the largest,

most fertile and in all things the grandest state in the union. Twenty-five years ago she was a wilderness, but today is populated with as good, as honest, as industrious, as liberty loving a people as were ever known. Among her population is the German-American, who came here seeking liberty, and the fact that they have contributed so great an extent to the prosperity of our great state shows that they are thoroughly identified with us.

The speaker then gave a history of the German and Anglo-Saxon races as learned in youth from Roman literature, and again congratulated them upon their citizenship among the people and in a country in which the honor of her men and the virtue of her women is cherished.

The typical character of the German is that he is temperate, frugal, industrious and brave, and longing for that liberty their forefathers longed for, they came among us believing they could get that liberty here.

No country has produced greater masters in art, science and literature than Germany, and none more patriotic. They have stood by their convictions for ages and claim the right to reason for themselves and transmit this noble principle to their children. They recognize in our republic the virtue of equality of all men before the law and the tax gatherer and appreciate the principle we revere—the liberty of all to do as they please so long as in so doing the rights of others are not infringed. No people ever surrendered a right that was ever given back to them. Your greatest liberties are constrained only by the rights of others as long as you continue to keep alive this principle and to transmit it to your children you are safe.

At the conclusion of Judge Gerald's address Judge Schutze of Austin was introduced and after a few introductory remarks complimentary to the speaker who had preceded him and a word in favor of George Clark for governor he delivered a lengthy speech in the German language, which could not be understood by THE NEWS reporter, but judging from the appearance was well received.
