Clark went to San Antonio loaded for Bexar.

Fifty-six years ago Sam Houston turned Texas loose on the banks of the San Jacinto. In August next George Clark will turn Texas loose at Houston on the banks of Buffalo Bayou.

The Clark campaign committee is receiving calls for more literature than they can supply on demand. The people are earnest and anxious about this campaign and that means success for Clark.

The administration clackers charged Clark with making the race to beat Hogg and not for the nomination himself. Now they are caucusing to find a man who can beat Clark after Hogg is out of the race.

The crazy fiend or fiends who murdered those four women in Denison if caught ought to suffer for the crime just the same as a sane person. THE NEWS assumes that the assassin was crazy because a human being possessed of his right mind could never butcher defenseless women in that way. When a human being gets to that point in his thirst for blood he has lived long enough.

There will be 79 votes in the congressional convention, and under the two-thirds rule 54 will be necessary to a choice. Only four counties have elected delegates. They are McLennan, Navarro, Burleson and Falls. Gerald has McLennan, 8 votes; Ben Rice, Falls, 8 votes; Pendleton, Navarro, 14 votes, and Burleson 4 votes, and if Pendleton gets Bell, his own county, which is conceded to him, he will go into the convention with 35 votes. Milam will instruct for Antony and Limestone for Blake, leaving Washington doubtful. It is now certain that the contest will be an exciting one. Neither one of the candidates can possibly get the necessary two-thirds on the first ballot, and if the delegates stand firm there will be a lock. On account of the small vote of McLennan, which is less than half what it ought to be, Judge Gerald is placed at a disadvantage. If he can carry Washington he will be second in the race and will stand a good chance to be nominated. From the signs of the times at present it will be a lock between Gerald and Pendleton.

THE PEOPLE'S HOMES IN JEOPARDY.

In the wild and reckless prosecution of the railroad corporations by the present state administration he has reached a point that does not only establish beyond question the truth of the charge made against Gov. Hogg of rabid hostility to railroads and a determination to crush them out of existence if possible, but it shows an utter disregard of the interests of the people of Texas individually and collectively. The Val Verde suits brought into question the title of 20,000,000 acres of land scattered all over Texas, most of it held by actual settlers for which they have paid their good money and upon which they have by dint of labor placed many millions of dollars in improvements. The state claims one twentieth of these lands and the governor says if he is re-elected he will make the railroads and the people disgorge. Suit has been instituted in Wichita county by Attorney General Culberson seeking to recover from the Houston and Texas Central all the lands granted to it by the state, amounting to about 6,000,000 acres, much of which has been sold to actual settlers. Since this suit was filed it has been impossible for these people to obtain loans on their lands and as a result further improvement has been stopped indefinitely. It is impossible to estimate the damage to Texas directly and indirectly growing out of these suits. Not satisfied with the deadly stab at the material development of the state contained in the alien land law passed by the regular session of the legislature—a law which cast suspicion not only upon the people of Texas but upon the validity of the stocks and bonds of every corporate institution in the state which owned land even for business purposes; so determined was Governor Hogg to "bust" the corporations that he hesitated not to strike down the homes of a large number of Texas people in order that he might bring the railroad corporations to his feet. The Fort Worth Gazette in giving a history of the legislation relative to the central land subsidy raises the point that should the state be successful in wresting these lands from the railroad they "would not be subject to homestead location as article 3936 of the revised statutes excepts from such disposition of lands held under color of title from the state." The settlers then could not pre-empt the lands after the railroad is made to "disgorge" but would be the prey of the land sharks who hold certificates on thousands of acres of Texas lands and who stand ready to pounce upon every acre recovered by the state. This is the state of things brought upon us by our present governor. Could madness go further? Are the people of Texas to be robbed of their homes that the governor's hatred of railroad corporations may be appeased? It is time to appeal to conservatism. It is time that men who have cast their fortunes with the empire state of the South come forward in solid phalanx and demand that the inveterate and indiscriminate war on our land titles shall stop. It is no time for compromise or flinching. Hon. George Clark stands as the champion of conservatism, justice, peace and progress. Every patriot knows his duty and he should, in this needy hour, perform it without fear or faltering. Texas must be released from this thralldom. George Clark pitched the battle, is making the bravest fight for Texas that has ever been made since Houston, Crockett, Bowie, Travis and all those heroes of the early days fought for her freedom. Will Texas people who have seen the honor of their state suffer at the hands of ignorance and officialism put their brand of approval upon it? Will they stand idle and see this vicious attack upon their land titles succeed? Will they return to power the man

who has brought distress to thousands by his senseless truckle to a morbid sentiment? Two more years of Hogg would bankrupt Texas. Restore him and turn Texas loose.

A MODERN ATTILLA.

Senator Garwood the brilliant young lawyer and statesman from Bastrop county delivered an eloquent speech in Dallas Wednesday night from which the following is reproduced. It strikes two vital points in Hogg's administration: "Since Atilla with his Huns decended upon the plains of sunny Italy there has been no such attack upon the land titles and values of a country as Gov. Hogg is making today upon the homes of honest settlers. And to what end? He says to give to the school fund—lend to the railroads. How beautiful is this chain of progress. The state gives the land to the railroad. The railroad sells the land to the private citizen who builds his home thereon. Gov. Hogg makes the private citizen 'disgorge' and lends the amount recovered to the railroads. The difference between the two candidates stands prominent here. Clark believes in quieting the titles to these lands and will recommend a validating act. Hogg pros to take their lands away from them, sell them and lend the money to the railroads. Clark proposes, in case there is any money to lend, to let the people have it. This case, like another of his (Hogg's) celebrated land cases which was also reversed by the supreme court, as usual, has done more to unsettle land values than all the land frauds and forgeries in Texas for forty years. No department of the government, state or municipal, is safe from his wild attacks. The state has been long struggling with the problem of how to control her convicts without leasing them. We believed that in the successful operation of our sugar farms we had reached a successful solution of the matter. The state of Texas, therefore is a large sugar grower competing with the planters of Louisiana. The federal government gives a bounty of a few cents on each pound of sugar raised. Now if we are in the sugar business we must conduct it on business principles, otherwise we should quit it. There was \$40,000 accruing to the state on this bounty. The legislature provided a method of receiving it. The governor vetoed the bill. He was opposed to bounties. So are we all. But to refuse to accept \$40,000, which alone can enable us to successfully compete with those who do accept it is sheer madness."
