**THE DANGER TO MILLS.**

Editor Vincent Writes About It to The Dallas News.

FORT WORTH, Tex., May 19.—[To The News.]—The editorial in this morning's News in reference to opposition to Senator Mills' election to the long term is timely and full of meaty suggestions. But the News representative is wide of the mark when he states that twenty-four men in Texas know of the secret but fearfully organizing opposition to the election of Col. Mills to the long term. Every man who was in the thick of the fight for Mills' election at the extra session knows of the opposition. The main cause assigned by leading alliance men for their opposition to Judge Clark is that "Clark jumped into the arena carrying Mills flag and organized the party to instruct for Mills." To get this opposition allayed Clark's advocates have promised that Mills would come home and demonstrate to the people that he had been consistent and was true to the Democratic doctrine of universal coinage of silver. It is well understood that Col. Mills is listening to the appeals of his late enemies not to come home and take part in the gubernatorial fight. Nobody wishes him to take part in the gubernatorial fight, but his sincere friends want him to meet these disaffected people and save himself.

It is a big mistake to suppose that Clark needs Mills' help. It is entirely the other way, judging from what old-time Democratic farmers tell me. In reference to Mills taking any part in the gubernatorial fight I consider it a matter to be left entirely to Col. Mills. Clark and his friends never stopped to ascertain policy nor to count the cost when they opened the fight for Mills. If Mills hesitates or dodges the fight and for his friends it is simply his business. It is sufficient to know that Clark and his friends have in every fight been able to take care of themselves. But it is a fact that the third party are solidly planning to capture the legislature with the chief purpose of defeating Mills. They declare they will yield everything to accomplish his defeat and they are effectively at work in my neck of the woods. **DIOCESAN COUNCIL.**

Proceedings of the Body Yesterday Afternoon and this Morning.

The first business after the council was called to order yesterday afternoon was the election of the clerical delegates to the general convention at Baltimore in October next:

Revs. T. B. Lee, S. M. Bird, Frank Page and C. M. Beckwith were elected as such delegates.

Clerical alternates—Revs. J. K. Carter, C. H. B. Turner, Matt Brewster and T. C. Cain.

Lay delegates to same—A. S. Richardson, H. M. Whitaker, L. Aubrey George E. Mann.

Lay alternates—Capt. Hanriok, A. R. Howard, John Harris and D. R. Meade.

The afternoon session was devoted to discussions, a prominent theme being the question of the expediency of electing an assistant bishop to carry out the functions of Bishop Gregg during the illness of the latter. Much diversity of opinion existed and the measure was by no means certain to prevail, when the name of Rev. G. H. Kinsolving, D. D., rector of the Church of the Epiphany, Philadelphia, Pa., was put in nomination for assistant bishop, and instantly all opposition melted. The nomination had a dozen seconds and was carried by a solid rising vote.
