There is nothing plainer than that Clark is gaining steadily every day, and that as the people are made acquainted with the administration of Gov. Hogg they are losing confidence in him.

After devoting four sections to the commission infant the Hogg platform adopted yesterday declares section five: "We believe that the interests of the whole state requires that the commissioners be kept out of politics."

There is less interest felt in the proceedings of congress this session than was ever known before. It is, perhaps, because this congress is not expected to do anything of general interest except adjourn.

The city authorities will spare no effort to break up the gang of toughs who have their headquarters in the reservation. The operations of these crooks have become notorious and must be stopped.

"The railway commission in view of the influence of the governor over the legislature needs the ministrations of a friendly governor, one that will nurse it in its infancy with tenderness and affection."—Hogg platform. Bring the paregoric or wake up Mrs. Winslow.

It makes all the difference in the world when it comes to "running" a convention whether the manipulators are Clark men or Hogg men. The Hogg men from the country are seemingly perfectly willing to allow the city to manage their conventions and their campaign if they are for Hogg.

Why did the Hogg men endeavor to elect Hogg delegates to the county convention if they did not approve of an expression on the gubernatorial question? They are entitled to no kick because they would have done just as did the Clark men if they had obtained a majority.

The Hogg resolutions say the commission is not a part of the constitution. It is now in order for Hogg to call the legislature together and have an amendment submitted to the people for adoption. The Clark men were of the opinion that a commission amendment had been adopted.

Mr. R. H. Kingsbury addressed the citizens of Houston on the evening of the 20th inst., and the Houston Herald pays him this handsome compliment: "The speech of Hon. Russell Kingsbury last evening was a terrific arraignment of Governor Hogg and his partisan administration and drew from his audience frequent and long continued applause. It was an able effort, inimitable in its originality and unanswerable in its logical argument. Mr. Kingsbury won for himself many admirers in this city who will esteem it a pleasure to compliment him with a crowded house upon any occasion in the future he may see fit to deliver a public address in Houston."

THE HOGG RALLY.

The mass meeting of the friends of Governor Hogg yesterday was pretty well attended and was not wanting in enthusiasm. The conduct of the convention showed that whatever prejudice the country people have against the town people if they have any, it does not apply to the supporters of the governor. The convention was manipulated from beginning to end by four or five Waco men and the country people who composed at least nine tenths of the convention submitted to everything suggested, with enthusiasm. It is all right for a man to live in the city and dominate a convention if he is a Hogg man. There was one feature in the discussions that is so silly as to be positively disgusting. It is the complaint against the Clark people for utilizing their majority in the late county convention. The idea that an assembly has not a right to give expression to whatever it pleases and transact the business brought before it according to the will of the majority is absurd and there is no use whining about it. If the Hogg men had dominated that convention they would have indorsed the administration, and they would not have given the Clark men any quarter. It isn't politics to do that. When a victory is won in politics as in war the advantage must be followed up and the winner obtain all the good to his cause possible. The gentlemen who conducted the meeting yesterday are well aware of this but

they seek to work upon the prejudices of the people in the country in order to chrysalize the opposition to Clark. They will doubtless win some votes that way but if you win a majority gentlemen will you use it, like the Clark men did, or will you permit your victory to be taken from you after it is won? THE NEWS desires to mention right here the fact that there is more intolerance among the Hogg people than any set of people on this earth. THE NEWS has nothing personal against Gov. Hogg or any of his friends, yet it is the subject of abuse, because it opposes Governor Hogg. THE NEWS believes honestly that it would be ruinous to Texas to re-elect Hogg. It believes it would be advantageous to the state to elect Clark. It presents the facts as it sees them to verify this view. In matters of news it prints the facts as it gets them and as will be seen by reference to the report of the convention yesterday and on previous occasions it makes no difference whether it is a Hogg convention or a Clark convention or a People's party convention. THE NEWS tells the truth and reports them in full. If some of our Hogg friends would just stop and consider a while they would discover that it is possible for men to live neighbors and be friends and still differ as to who should be governor.

WILL THE CONVENTION BE REMOVED?

The Houston Post a few days ago had an editorial notice of a rumor float in Houston to the effect that the state convention would be removed from Houston if Harris county did not instruct for Hogg. The Post did not seem to give credence to the rumor but dealt a stinging rebuke to the spirit that prompted such tactics. It closed with the declaration that Houston would comply with her contract to the letter as regards the preparations for the convention and Harris county would vote as she pleased. In yesterday's Post appears a communication from Major Looscan an ardent Hogg man which rather confirms the report that such a step was contemplated, though he attempts to deny it. Mr. Looscan says:

"The convention was brought here through the executive committee by the friends of the Hogg administration, and I defy The Post or any one now enlisted in Judge Clark's service to name an advocate of Judge Clark or that commission who voted for Houston for the location. There is one thing certain, that if it had been known to the state executive committee that the Republicans of this place, in behalf of the Liquor association, would cooperate to openly fight the administration and raise subscriptions for the Clark club, it is certain they would never have selected Houston. The location of the convention at Houston entirely depends upon the report of the sub-committee which was appointed to visit Houston and examine into her conveniences for such convention, and if their report be adverse, then the matter reverts to the state executive committee for further action." The sub-committee has visited Houston and it was just after this visit that the report of the removal of the convention was circulated. There is just two ways and only two, to account for this report. A removal of the convention is contemplated or the report was circulated to influence voters in the city of Houston which has demonstrated beyond question its preference for Clark. Either one of these methods is contemptible and mean and THE NEWS does not believe a majority of the state executive committee could be brought to countenance any thing of the kind, but, if the sub-committee makes an adverse report they will of course do it upon other grounds. Mr. Looscan claims for the Hogg men the credit for selecting Houston and seems to think the opposition should be silent and inactive on that account. The Clark men made no effort to con-

trol or influence the action of the committee, and when Houston was selected they were well pleased, but if the committee undertake to remove it there will be the biggest howl raised that was ever heard in Texas.

The chances of Gov. Hogg are becoming desperate. The indications are that the administration forces will center on McLennan, Clark's home county, with the express purpose of carrying it for Hogg at all hazards for the effect it will have throughout the state in the event of success. Judge Clark's friends have no notion of permitting their candidate to be humiliated by the loss of his own county if they can help it, and they can help it, by telling the truth and telling it often. The administration people do not care particularly for McLennan county's eight votes, but they want to humiliate Judge Clark by arraying his neighbors against him and try to influence other counties. The fight now inaugurated in this county against Judge Clark will not accomplish its purposes.
