FORFEITURE OF  
LANDS DELAYEDLAND COMMISSIONER ROBINSON ON  
ACCOUNT OF RECENT DROUGHT  
POSTPONES IT TO NOV. 1.

News of interest to large ranch owners in the recently drought stricken section of the lower coast country was contained in a letter received today by County Clerk Joseph Webb from State Land Commissioner J. T. Robinson who announces that on account of the former conditions and loss of livestock, he has decided not to forfeit lands in Cameron county for non-payment of interest to November 1. The previous date was August 15.

The land commissioner says:

On account of the extraordinary bad conditions in your County by reason of the drought, which has resulted in the loss of a great deal of stock, I have concluded not to forfeit lands in your county for non-payment of interest to November 1, 1916, as I have heretofore advertised I would do on August 15th. As to what time forfeitures will be declared I can not now even suggest, but rest assured ample notice will be given owners in advance of such forfeiture for them to have plenty of time to pay their interest. I have not heretofore communicated this to your county for the reason some people might have been unkind enough to think I was postponing forfeitures in order to induce people in the counties affected to vote for me. As the election will be held tomorrow I am sending this at the earliest date I could without your having received it before election.

TAMPICO STORES  
MAY CLOSE SOONCONSIDER NEW ISSUE OF CURRENCY  
TO BE PRACTICALLY WORTHLESS.  
MERCHANTS OBJECT TO ISSUE.

Merchants at Tampico, Mexico, are at the point of closing their stores at moment's notice, according to Leo Felischman of that city, who is now in Brownsville. At the time he left Tampico, a few weeks ago, he said this morning, there was a growing dissatisfaction at conditions. He has since received letters at intervals keeping him informed upon the situation.

The merchants, he said, object to the new issue of currency that was dumped upon them at ten per cent of face value and has since dropped to five cents on the dollar, nominally and practically of no value at all. Fear that their licenses will be revoked should they close their doors has ceased to be a motive for their keeping them open, he said, and only the belief that their stocks would be seized by the government now causes them to hesitate in the matter.

General Caballero is  
Back at the Capital

Announcement that General Luis Caballero, military governor of the State of Tamaulipas, Mexico, and commander of the military zone corresponding to that state, has returned to his headquarters at Victoria, was confirmed this morning by Mexican Consul J. Z. Garza.

General Caballero, Mr. Garza stated, left the State of Tamaulipas several months ago on a leave of absence and since that time had been in Mexico City. During his absence his son-in-law Colonel Paul Garza, has exercised the office of governor ad interim and General E. P. Nafarrate, his chief of staff, automatically assumed command of the military zone.

Mr. Garza stated that rumors to the effect that there had been any dissatisfaction with either General Nafarrate or General Ricant, commander on the spot, he said, will be removed from the frontier. Neither Nafarrate nor Ricant where they are now stationed unless it be for military exigencies, in which cases the changes will either be promotions or to posts equal to those they now occupy. Nafarrate, he said, will continue in the office he held prior to General Caballero's absence.

KENANSVILLE, N. C., July 24.—Considerable interest is manifested in the outcome of the case of Samuels Stocks, charged with having participated in the lynching of Joseph Black, which was docketed for trial today in the Duplin county court. Black, a negro, had been arrested for furnishing his son with a gun after the latter had attacked a white girl. On April 5 the father was taken from the Lenoir county jail at Kinston and carried to Greene county and put to death. Stocks, a resident of Greene county, is accused of having been a leader of the lynching party.
