ABOUT THE ARMY WORM

COL. GAY DOES NOT ASSOCIATE IT WITH THE PTERILLAR FOUND IN HIS GARDEN RECENTLY.
To the Herald:
Mr. W. J. ... has got his "worms crossed." The cotton caterpillar, or leaf worm, sometimes called the "army worm" because when they become numerous enough to eat a crop of cotton, get on the ground and crawl, r march out. The caterpillar that I speak of comes from the north which flies only at night, and the only preventative of these insects is by getting out at night and catching them, which process has long since been abandoned by most farmers for the reason that they can be easily poisoned. The worm, or caterpillar, when grown, webs up the cotton leaf and soon becomes a pupa and soon develops into the moth, which deposits its eggs usually in the top of the stalk of cotton. They never fly in the daytime, but rest all day on the limbs of the cotton stalk and only fly when disturbed, except at night when they fly every year in the month of May and if the summer is dry and they seldom do harm, but if we have a heavy rain in May and June we will likely have trouble with them. They are easily killed, and it can be cheaply done by dusting the plant with Paris green when properly prepared. One man can destroy the worms on twenty to thirty acres a day. One pound of Paris green is sufficient for an acre. I would suggest that the dealers buy a small amount of poison only, for they will disappear. It usually takes them a week before they do much harm.

TEXAS BUILDING TAG DAY MAY 23

EIGHT DAYS BEFORE DAY DESIGNATED BY PANAMA-PACIFIC EXPOSITION COMMISSION FOR SECURING FUNDS FOR BUILDING.

WORK WAS RETARDED

TRouble IN MEXICO DELAYED MATTERS, BUT PROSPECTS ARE UNUSUALLY BRIGHT FOR GATHERING A SUFFICIENT AMOUNT.

Austin, Texas, May 15.—Eight days remain before the Tag Day designated by the Panama-Pacific Exposition commission of Texas, for the securing of funds for a Texas building at the Exposition, will be held. On that date it is believed that sufficient money will be raised to make the erection of a building possible, and work will then be started for the collecting of an exhibit. May 2 was formerly set aside by the Governor in an official proclamation, but owing to the inability of the Commission to perfect an organization through the State postponement was made until May 23.

The Mexican trouble has retarded the work of the Commission, but the prospects are unusually bright for the gathering of sufficient funds to make the project a success. With \$25,000.00 secured to guarantee the erecting of a building, it is the belief of the Commission that less trouble will be experienced in gathering the finest exhibit of Texas products possible for the Exposition.

Col. Abe Gross of Waco, has been designated by the Panama-Pacific Exposition authorities at San Francisco to co-operate with the members of the Texas commission as a special representative, and will work with Secretary J. T. Bowman of the commission in securing contributions from the large interests of the State.

The action of the Lumbermen's Convention in pledging all the wood that will be used in the building has been followed up by a Tile Plant in South Texas which has offered the tiling that will be used both for exterior and interior work. It is believed that other Texas industries will also offer their products for use in the building in order that the Texas structure may be erected and finished of products all of which have come from the Lone Star State.

Houston will fall in line for about the same amount, but neither San Antonio nor Fort Worth have given definite answers. Galveston is another of the larger cities that still has the matter under consideration. Beaumont is well organized, as are many other centers of the State business interests.
