COUNTY JUDGE OF HIDALGO COUNTY SAYS CROPS ARE FINE. CABBAGE ESPECIALLY SO.

"Crops are in a good shape up our way, cabbage especially so, and the only thing that now bothers the farmers of Hidalgo county is whether or not the prices for cabbage will be good," said J. H. Edwards of Edinburg, county judge of Hidalgo county, who is a visitor in Brownsville. Judge Edwards states that land is selling fast in Hidalgo county, and that if the present rate keeps up there is no telling when Hidalgo county will be sold out entirely.
