For the Methodist church, the pastor Rev. J. S. Bowles, reported good prayer meeting Wednesday evening. Sunday school up to the best of the year and the Sunday services helpful in every way. WHAT IS ROB ROY IN INTEREST OF MILITARY ROAD

COMMITTEE WILL GO TO WASHINGTON WITH DATA COVERING PROPOSED HIGHWAY BETWEEN BROWNSVILLE AND EL PASO.

ANNOUNCEMENT MADE

D. E. COLP WITH SEVERAL OTHERS DUE IN BROWNSVILLE JANUARY 15 AND WILL BEGIN LOG OF ROAD FROM HERE.

A committee to go to Washington in the interest of the proposed military highway from El Paso to Brownsville will be appointed at the good roads convention to be held at Eagle Pass Jan. 21. This announcement was made yesterday by D. E. Colp, secretary of the Bexar County Highway League, who is one of the prime movers in the enterprise at this end of the line. The committee will not go empty handed either, for the proposed route will have been logged and thoroughly examined and inspected from one end to the other before the delegates from all along the border gather at Eagle Pass.

Another delegation from El Paso and towns east of that city will make the trip to Eagle Pass, performing the same functions as that to be performed by the good roads crowd leaving Brownsville.

The distance to be traversed is practically the same, there being a difference of approximately fifteen miles, depending, of course, on the itineraries selected.

Accompanying Mr. Colp will be John W. Warren, C. O. Austin and Homer D. Wade of Stamford, secretaries of the State Good Roads Association.

SHEPPARD FAVERS IT.

Mr. Colp thinks that starting from Brownsville January 16 the party will drive to Eagle Pass on the evening of January 20 in time for the joint meeting of the Southern National and Military Highway Associations. The itinerary will be decided when the San Antonio party arrives in Brownsville. As this is the time when there is more or less of a lull in bus'ness activity it is thought every town and village within sight of the smoke of the Mexican civil war will send its representative.

Mr. Colp said the logging party will have gained an intimate knowledge of conditions as they exist along the border now, how hard it is to patrol that territory and these facts they intend placing before the Committee on Military Affairs.

Senator Morris Sheppard recently wrote Mr. Colp advising him to send a committee. Later he wrote that he would advise others of the interested parties as to the time of its coming. The

ther at Eagle Pass.

Mr. Colp, with several other good roads men from San Antonio, will leave for Brownsville on January 15, where they will be joined by a party to log the road from that place to Eagle Pass a distance of about 130 miles. At intermediate points they will be joined by others and by the time their destination is reached it is expected that the delegation will have grown to a long procession of automobiles. Mr. Colp said the logging party will be within sight of the river at all points, where the sand may be too deep to travel through in automobiles. If this proves true the motor cars will be sent around by another route, while he and some other members of the party go over the trail on horseback.

COLP IS OPTIMISTIC.

Arrangements already have been made for a corps of newspaper men and photographers to accompany the party, both to record the observations of officials.

Speaking of the trip, Mr. Colp said:

"This, I think is the first actual step towards getting a road along the border built. We have laid all our plans, set the matter before Congress, got Washington officials as well as the people along the border interested in the project, and made arrangements for getting the necessary data. It now remains for us to supply the committee on Military Affairs with all the tangible information we can get and then I believe favorable results will be forthcoming."
