NEW PHONE LINE IS IN OPERATION

PEOPLE OF POINT ISABEL NOW IN TOUCH WITH OUTSIDE WORLD THROUGH A MODERN TELEPHONE LINE.

Manager Gerald Johnson of the local exchange of the Southwestern Telegraph & Telephone company announced today that the new telephone line connecting Point Isabel and Brownsville has finally been placed in operation. The cut-in was made yesterday, and now the little coast town has a line that is modern in every respect, being built of good poles and a first class copper wire circuit.

Charles Chalmers, the Point Isabel merchant, has been appointed agent at that place for the company, and the business will be handled through his place. The prime reason for the construction of this new and expensive line to Point Isabel is said to have been the establishment at Point Isabel of a wireless telegraph tower by the United States Navy department. This wireless plant is now being planned at Washington, and it is expected that it will be completed and in operation by next fall.

Post Office Department Cruelly Orders Destroyed Two Bottles of Brandy

Two bottle of good old apricot brandy were destroyed at the Brownsville post office this morning by order of the department at Washington. Several men about the building considered the waste sinful, and offered to destroy the product by using buckets. However, that kind of destruction was in violation of the postal laws, and the powers that be looked out the back window while the delicious liquid was being filtered to the ground. Regrets were many and freely expressed, but "orders are orders."

It seems that the brandy was mailed to an old Mexican woman here as a gift from a very good friend. The postal laws prohibit strictly the sending of liquids through the mails. In accordance with those instructions the two bottles were held up here, and Washington was asked as to what disposition should be made of them, and the orders said "destroy." And an old Mexican woman is forced to do without her brandy.
