5,000 Hides Comprised
Biggest Importation

What is said to be one of the largest single hide importations ever made thru the Brownsville port crossed the international bridge Thursday. The shipment contained 5000 hides consigned by Andres Pocheco to J. I. Voorhies, representing the Howard hide and leather company at San Antonio. The shipment represented a cash outlay of about \$35,000.

Mr. Voorhies said yesterday that while there was no import duty on hides the Mexican authorities had levied an export tax of 22 cents national gold per pound. The hides were shipped to San Antonio, five freight cars being required for their accommodation.

AGREE ON TRIAL
PAVING SUITS

ATTORNEYS FOR CITY AND PROPERTY OWNERS POSTPONE CASES—TO BE TRIED IN NOVEMBER.

Judge James A. Graham, attorney for the city in the paving tax matters, announced today the conclusion of an agreement with Harbert Davenport, of the James B. Wells law firm, for the trial of some fifty paving tax suits in the lump during the November term of the district court.

An injunction proceeding by the property owners to prevent the city collecting the taxes, amounting to about \$30,000, is also pending and will be heard before the paving tax suits. When this is disposed of, the tax suits will come up, the entire number to be tried in one, in accordance with the agreement. The agreement was enabled to be reached as a result of the Wells firm representing practically all the property owners involved.

Judge Graham Thursday afternoon took the matter up with Mayor A. Albert Browne and City Manager F. H. Williams, who in behalf of the city agreed to a postponement and a hearing of all in the cases in one in November.

First Direct Wire To
Houston Inaugurated

For the first time in its history Brownsville is connected with Houston by a telegraph wire. Manager A. W. Reed of the local office of the Western Union announced today the completion of a duplex copper wire stretching from Brownsville to Houston, and the installation of which permits the sending of messages direct to Houston instead of by way of San Antonio, by which route messages have always gone out of Brownsville and all points in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. This improvement also facilitates service to Houston and Galveston, doing away with the former relay at San Antonio.

Col. Blocksom Leaves
Saturday For Mercedes

Colonel A. P. Blocksom, whose recommendation that he be allowed to establish the Third United States cavalry's headquarters at Mercedes, has been approved, leaves for Mercedes Saturday. With Colonel Blocksom's departure, Colonel E. E. Hatch automatically becomes post commander at Fort Brown.

It is reported at Fort Brown that Colonel Jacob Galbraith, assigned to the Third cavalry, may be sent to Fort Brown later as post commander, in view of the fact that Fort Brown has always been considered a cavalry post. However, Colonel Galbraith is not likely to come here, if at all, until after the disposal of the courtmartial trials of the Texas guardsmen at Fort San Houston which are not scheduled to come up until June 6.
