Texas Potatoes.

Washington, D. C., July 6.—Texas produced 2,850,000 bushels of potatoes in 1911 with a total farm value of \$3,591,000 or \$1.26 per bushel, according to a report of the Federal Department of Agriculture. The production of the United States as a whole was 292,737,000 bushels with a farm value of \$233,778,000, or 79.9¢ per bushel.

SWAT THE FLY CONTEST ENDS.

William Shears Wins First Prize Results Very Meager.

The Swat-the-Fly contest inaugurated on May 4, by the ladies of the Civic League came to an end Saturday, the results showing William Shears the winner of the first prize \$16.15, Antonio Gonzalez taking the second prize \$5.

The results of the contest have been discouraging to the ladies, as there were only five entries throughout the entire two months, and the quantity of flies killed hardly justify the fine prizes offered.

In addition to the first and second prizes offered by the Civic League, the Grand Theatre donated \$6.15 to swell the first prize, which was originally \$10. The Herald, wishing to encourage the move also offered a prize of \$1 for each of the five next highest scores. There were, however, only three entries besides those taking the first and second.

The record was kept throughout the contest by City Secretary Crisanto Villareal, the swatters reporting to him every Saturday at the city hall. The complete returns show the following entries and amounts of flies killed by each:

William Shears 8 qts. 1 pt.
Antonio Gonzalez 4 qts. 1-2 pt.
Carlos Castaneda 1 qt. 0 pt.
Isaac Montes 1 pt.
William Scanlan 1-2 pt.

Total flies killed, 14 qts. 1 pt. Each prize winner will be required to obtain a voucher or note from City Secretary Villareal, showing him to be entitled to the prize, or certifying the amount of flies killed by the bearer during the contest. The winners of the first and second prizes will be paid upon presentation of their claim to the Civic League, and the next three on the list will be paid on presenting their claims at the business office of The Herald.

NEW UNIFORMS FOR BROWNSVILLE'S FINEST

The police force of Brownsville are to have spick and span brand new uniforms issued to them this week.

The uniform consists of dark blue serge pants and coat the patrolmen having their uniforms trimmed with nickel buttons, while that of the chief is trimmed with bronze buttons, the whole topped off with a light drab beaver hat.

This new move in the right direction, as of late it has been impossible to distinguish a patrolman from an ordinary citizen except for his badge which is not a very conspicuous object.
