THIEVES VISIT**OTHER RESIDENCES**

Homes of J. M. Dwyer and E. McLain Entered—Property Taken to Value of \$300.

Sunday night two more residences were visited by burglars, and the total of the loot this time will reach probably \$300. So far no arrests have been made, but there is a suspect in one of the Sunday night cases, in which about \$150 cash was secured.

J. M. Dwyer, 812 Washington street, reported that his residence had been visited sometime Sunday night between 10:30 and 4 o'clock in the morning. The valuables secured were a diamond breast pin, one gold watch, a chain, two men's hats, and a pair of scissors; total estimated value \$150.

Mr. Dwyer values the watch highly, not so much because of its intrinsic value, but because of the fact that his wife's picture is made into the dial. Mr. Dwyer offers a reward of \$25 for the return of the stuff, and a reward of \$50 for the return of the valuables and the arrest and conviction of the thief.

The other place entered was the residence of E. McLain, over the San Antonio restaurant, of which he is proprietor. Here \$150 in cash, in a leather pouch with receipts, a poll tax receipt and other papers, was secured. The money was the restaurant receipts for Saturday and Sunday, and which Mr. McLain had not had an opportunity to deposit in the bank.

There is a suspect in this case, and he is supposed to be in Matamoros. The robbery took place about 1 o'clock Monday morning. It is thought that the thief went up the rear stairway, climbing to the roof of an adjoining one-story building. He made his way along the roof to a balcony in front of the restaurant. A door opens into the rooms from the balcony, and it had been left open. Entrance was therefore easily made.

NO ARREST YET.

No arrest has been made yet in connection with the killing of Placido Cruz. Deputy Sheriff Longoria and Constable J. Lopez returned yesterday morning from Dos de Copas ranch, on the Alice road, where they went Sunday afternoon to investigate the shooting that resulted in the death of Placido Cruz Sunday morning.

Ignacio Trevino, the former Brownsville policeman, who is alleged to have fired the shots that killed Cruz, has not yet been apprehended. It is thought that he may be in hiding somewhere in that section of the county where the shooting occurred.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION HELD FEBRUARY FIRST

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on February 1, 1913, an examination is to be held in Brownsville to fill a vacancy in the position of deputy collector and inspector of customs, the position paying three dollars a day. The examination will be for any vacancy that may occur in Brownsville.

The age limit is 18 years or over on the date of the examination, and the vacancy is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application form No. 1371 may be obtained from the secretary of the board of examiners at the customs house or post office in Brownsville, or from H. A. Leche, secretary of the Tenth Civil Service District, Custom House, New Orleans, La.

NAPOLITA MAIL DELIVERY PROBABLE AT EARY DAY

Apparently the long delayed free delivery of mail for the Napolita Loop will be authorized in the near future. From Assistant Postmaster Pierce it is learned that the service will very probably be ordered established this fall, and possibly within the next month. A letter received by Postmaster Rentfro from C. B. Anderson, inspector in charge of postal matters for the states of Texas and Louisiana.

A Healthy Herd and Sanitary Dairy.

A short time ago we told in these columns of improvements made by T. J. Lawson for the housing of his dairy cows and the handling of his milk in a sanitary manner. At milking time the cows are driven into a barn having a concrete floor, put into stanchions and cleaned; thus reducing to a minimum the chance of dirt entering the milk. After being drawn from the cows the milk is removed from the barn, strained three times, aerated, put into bottles and sealed with a cap. To further insure a pure product, Mr. Lawson had his entire herd subjected to the tubercular test for tuberculosis to which test none reacted, proving that they are free from tuberculosis. The test was applied by Dr. Major Schofield, U. S. veterinarian. It is safe today that Mr. Lawson is thoroughly equipped to produce and handle milk in a thoroughly sanitary manner and to furnish a product which is hard to beat.

A Trackless Trolley.

Kissena Park, N. Y.—A corporation is now being formed for the purpose of constructing a trackless trolley line extending from the intersection of Oak and Rose avenues at Kissena Lake Park, through Oak avenue to Jamaica or Colden avenue, and through either of these, as may be selected, to the main street station in Flushing. The organizers of this company are J. W. Paris and W. F. Hencken, of the Paris-Hencken company, and it is for the purpose of developing and improving their Kissena Park holdings that this new line is being installed. The trackless trolley was first used successfully in Germany three or four years ago, and one has recently been put in use in New Jersey. The equipment consists of a palace trolley car on rubber tired wheels, with double trolley wires above to give return current. A special feature of this method of transportation is the fact that it can be operated over any paved or macadam road without tracks, and it is possible to steer the car over the road so as to avoid other vehicles and also to run to the curb when discharging or loading passengers.—Municipal Journal.
