TO START HOME FOR GIRLS SUNDAY

Ground Will Be Broken and Services Held Immediately After.

Sunday afternoon the Y. W. C. A. will hold a ground breaking meeting followed by the formal breaking of ground for the new boarding home at the Missouri street site of the new association boarding home. Miss Helen F. Barnes, one of the national secretaries of the Y. W. C. A. will be here from New York and will remove the first shovel full of earth from the Missouri street lots, where the boarding home is to be located.

Miss Barnes will address a mass meeting of women at one of the churches Sunday afternoon preceding the ground-breaking ceremony at the building site. Saturday evening Miss Barnes will be the guest of the El Paso association at a banquet to be given in her honor.

Work will start next week on the construction of the new boarding home. The revised plans for the boarding home have been completed by the architect, showing an additional floor on the building. A number of other changes have been made in the arrangement of the home, sewing rooms and kitchenette having been added to the plan for the third floor dormitory.

TWO WAREHOUSES ARE BEING BUILT

West Texas Fuel Company Constructing Buildings in City.

Warehouses for the West Texas Fuel company are being built in the Cotton addition. A grain house and a hay house are being built by the Fuel company east of Magoffin avenue in the East El Paso addition. The hay house is 50 by 40 feet, of brick construction with a concrete floor and metal roof. The grain house will be of corrugated iron with stone foundation and concrete floor. The buildings will cost \$3000 and the frame and brick work is being put up this week.

RAILROAD NOTES.

The National Railways of Mexico and the Mexican railway have pooled their freight rates on railroads for the Casas Grande-Madre extension from the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad company.

The National Railways of Mexico and the Mexican railway have pooled their traffic between Vera Cruz and Mexico, and the office of the Mexican railway in New York city has been closed.

The railway commission of Nevada has ordered extensive reductions in freight rates on the Southern Pacific. The order does not go into effect for at least 30 days, and there is talk that the railway will resist the order.

The Rock Island lines on March 1 established a telegraphic news service on the Rocky Mountain Limited between Chicago and Colorado points, similar to that previously established on the Golden State Limited. These trains also have Victrola musical records and complete stock market quotations.

Lewis Kingman, assistant chief engineer of the National Railways of Mexico, the Mexican International and the Inter-oceanic at Mexico City, Mex., has been appointed engineer maintenance of way with office at Buenavista, succeeding C. G. Delo, resigned. H. B. Reese, division engineer at Chihuahua, succeeds Mr. Kingman, with office at Mexico City.

According to press reports from Monclova, Mex., a contract has been let for building a line between Monclova, Coahuila and Chihuahua, 410 miles, and work is to be started as soon as the necessary equipment and the laborers can be obtained. The new line will reach Abasco coal fields, 120 miles west of Monclova, the entire output

RAILROAD NEWS.

G. H. TRAIN HITS MULE TEAM

One of the Mules Is Killed at the Piedras Street Crossing.

As a result of a collision this morning between the Sunset limited, on the G. H., and a team of mules and a wagon, belonging to George Brady, a contractor, one of the mules was killed and the wagon was practically demolished. The accident occurred at 7:15 on the G. H. tracks at Piedras street.

A Mexican, who has driving the mules, was thrown into the air by the force of the collision, but escaped with a few bruises. Brady, the owner of the outfit, is team foreman for the Texas Bitulitic company. He had started the Mexican to the Caples stone crusher for a load of rock.

SPECIAL MILEAGE TO BE PUT ON SALE

Santa Fe and Other Roads Arrange Jointly to Use It.

The Santa Fe will on April 1 place on sale an interchangeable 2000 mile coupon ticket good on practically all roads in the central and western part of the United States, according to a bulletin received at the city ticket office this morning by James S. Morrison, agent, from J. M. Connel, general passenger agent. The coupon ticket will be honored by 59 railway companies. The participating carriers in west Texas are the Southwestern, Rock Island and Pecos Valley lines.

The coupons, which have a baggage permission condition, are printed to conform to the existing railroad fare in the several states through which the roads of the participating carriers run.

"The ticket is intended to fill the demand made by traveling salesmen who cover considerable territory on different lines of railroads," Mr. Morrison stated this morning. "It has been under consideration for some time, and will go into effect on April 1."

BIG BOX OF MACHINERY SHIPPED INTO MEXICO

The 4200 pound box of machinery, shipped from New York by express to a mining company down in Sonora, Mex., and which arrived in El Paso over the Santa Fe Sunday night, will be forwarded to its destination by freight, J. E. Elliott, Wells Fargo agent, being unable to locate an S. P. express car, the doors of which are large enough to admit the box. It will be shipped over the S. P. to Nogales. Since its arrival in El Paso the box has remained on a high truck on the Wells Fargo platform.

CANADIAN PART HERE IN PRIVATE AIR REPUBLIC

The private Pullman, Republic, occupied by G. W. Greenwood and party, of Montreal, Canada, is in the union station yards today, arriving last night over the Rock Island. The car will be pulled out tonight over the National Railways of Mexico. Mr. Greenwood and his guests expect to spend several weeks in the Mexican republic.

DINING CARS ON ALL S. P. TRAINS INTO CITY.

The dining car service on S. P. trains west making connections here with trains 1 and 2 on the Rock Island-Southwestern, has not been discontinued. The dining car has only been taken off these trains on the Southwestern. The S. P. runs diners on all its passenger trains.

SPECIAL RATES ANNOUNCED FOR VARIOUS CONVENTIONS

Low rates have been announced on a number of the railroads running into El Paso for various conventions over the state within the near future. For the meeting of the Scottish Rite Masons in El Paso on March 21 to 26, the National Railways of Mexico will place round trip tickets on sale from as far south as Torreon, for one and one-third fare, on March 17 to 23, return limit March 30.

The T. & P. is offering a round trip rate of \$22.10 to Fort Worth for the meeting of the Fat Stock Feeders and Breeders' association, on March 14 to 19. Tickets will be placed on sale March 12 to 17.

ILLINOIS MEN BUY LOWER VALLEY RANCH, OF 400 ACRES FOR \$10,800

Activity in valley lands resulted in the transfer of one of the largest ranches in the lower valley Tuesday. E. W. Farwell and C. A. Kays, of Lincoln, Ill., have purchased 400 acres of land below Tornillo, Tex., from Anderson, Lovetz and Grant, of El Paso. The price was \$10,800 and the sale was made by W. D. Landsden, of the Peterson-Landsden Realty company of Ysleta.

The purchasers of the tract are planning to improve it with a large ranch house and will put the entire 400 acres under cultivation this year for growing alfalfa. Fruit trees will be planted and other improvements will be made to the property, which will be one of the most complete alfalfa ranches in the El Paso valley.

SHELDON SITE IS HELD FOR \$350,000

A price of \$350,000 has been fixed by the Sheldon company, the holding company which owns the site and building occupied by the Sheldon hotel. This is the price which the owners asked for the building and site when approached by the special hotel committee

of the chamber of commerce, which has been preparing a report on the proposed sites for the new hotel.
