How the Maestro Will Play When He Grows Blind.

The Tribune has a letter from the "Atlantic Ocean," written at sea by Miss Kate Field, who thus speaks of a fellow-passenger: Anton Rubinstein agrees with me. He is seated at my left, and looks like the remains of former greatness. He is in a state of collapse, and I am hesitant enough to rejoice, for at sea misery like company. I derive inexpressible comfort in beholding genius reduced to my own level. The sea is Democratic in its tendencies; it is no great respecter of persons, else it would spare the great pianist who has done so much to elevate the musical standard in America, and whose great objection to our country is that it is 3,000 watery miles from Europe.

"Ah, if it were not for that!" he exclaims, extending his arms toward the great restless monster surging and foaming around us. "America would be possible; but the very thought of repeating this journey of committing myself to an awful ocean with a chance of being swallowed up by it, unknown to my family—this thought, combined with my physical weakness, will prevent my return." "But you will go to us again?" I expostulate. "I do not say I will not, for who I dare predict the future; but never will I go as a pianist."

And thus it is I learn of Rubinstein's ambition and plans for the next ten years. Aged forty-three, he has been playing in public for thirty-three years, but to the piano for amusement. At six Rubinstein developed such rare and extraordinary love and ability that his parents soon decided upon his career. Studying never more than three hours a day, young Anton appeared publicly at ten years of age. "I played, but never practiced after I was thirteen," confesses the pianist, whom Robert Browning, in the musical critic, rightly pronounced "the greatest of them all."

What a terrible shock this is to plodders. Patience seeks without finding, and genius finds without seeking. But Rubinstein is exceptional. He is fired by musical passion. You fancy that he possesses enormous powers in his arms. It is all in his wrists and in his position. When he is inspired he becomes blind, and sure to injure himself. He has played for us once on board our good steamer. "Come, we will go now," he said one afternoon, beckoning to a few, and entering the ladies' saloon, he sat down to an upright grand and played the "Erl King" in a way that caused tears to come from passion he passed to the delicious softness of Schubert's "Auf dem Wasser, an exquisite poem as melody ever sang, then dashed into a brilliant waltz, and finally, being wrought up to the music, gave such a rendering of the finale of the third act of "The Huguenots" as made every operative performer of it puerile. It was not a piano forte arrangement. It was Meyerbeer without the voices, and yet Meyerbeer in all his glory, for every note received its true interpretation, and for the first time I realized the intensity of that famous duo for bass and soprano.

It was a tremendous performance. Rubinstein ceased to use the key-board, and upon concluding, blood was upon the keys. He had, in some impossible manner hurt his right thumb. "I always do something of this kind when I grow blind," he said, fishing off from the piano, showing himself then, as at all times, the most unassuming of men.
