Hon. Will Boyce was called to Channing last week to defend the commissioners' court in an injunction suit brought for the purpose of restraining the commissioners from building a court house in Channing, the suit being based on the fact that the county possessed an outstanding bond of \$1,000 upon which interest was being paid. Attorney Boyce's opinion on this matter was given weeks ago, and was correct. Judge Webster, in rendering decision, very correctly held that a county's funds could not be tied up and the commissioners rendered powerless simply because a thousand dollar bond remained unpaid.—Channing Courier.

Exterior Nearly Completed.

With the close of the day's work Saturday, the new court house presented a very creditable appearance, practically all of the stone work and wood work on the roof is completed. The dome which rises 30 feet above the roof is completed, lacking only a little work on the zinc covering.

The copper statue of "Justice" was raised to its position surmounting the dome Saturday and lends much more attractiveness to the general appearance of the building which is naturally inclined to look a little squatly, largely due to the wide wings and narrow roofing.

Until completed, a large portion of the work will be on the inside in plastering and finishing.
