KILLED IN A WRECK

Two Trainmen Killed, Others Injured in Wreck of a Passenger.

Kansas City, Jan. 15.—Two
trainmen are known to be dead and
another believed to be dead, and a
fourth probably fatally injured in
a wreck at Waldron, Mo., twelve
miles from Leavenworth, Kan., last
night, caused by a head-on collision
between Rock Island passenger
train No. 26 and a freight train.
Several passengers were slightly in-
jured. The dead are Engineer
James McQueen, of the freight and
baggage man, Charles Hart, Engi-
neer King of the passenger train is
missing and is believed to be under
the wreckage. Fireman G. S. Moll-
wood, is probably fatally injured.
An open switch was the cause of
the wreck.

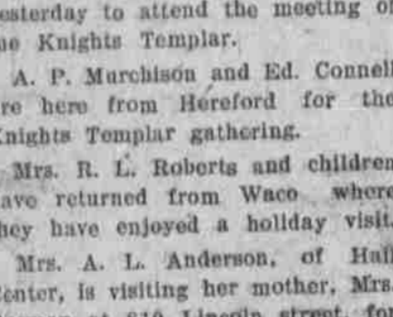
