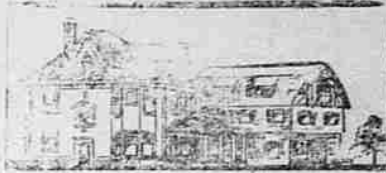

FREEMAN AT AUSTIN.

He Is Named President of Austin Dam and Suburban Railway.

Austin, Texas, May 2.—Receiver T. J. Freeman of the International and Great Northern was here today and attended the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Austin Dam and Suburban Railway.

The following officers were elected: T. J. Freeman, president; P. J. Lawless, vice president and treasurer; N. A. Stedman and J. E. Lucy, directors.

Judge Freeman called on the railroad commission. When asked about when the winding up of the receivership would take place, Judge Freeman said the matter was now up squarely to the creditors, stockholders and owners of the road and no progress had been made.

The Austin Dam and Suburban is considering the question of operating motor cars from Austin to the dam site.

About one thousand men at different shops of the Missouri Pacific and Iron Mountain systems quit work. They asked for a raise of 4 cents an hour and an improvement in working conditions. The company has offered them a 3 cent increase.

Family affairs are said to have led to the tragedy.
