## ORDER TO BOMBARD

PRESIDENT MADRIZ OF NICA-  
RAGUA ORDERS COMMANDER  
ARIZ OF THE VENUS TO BOM-  
BARD BLUEFIELDS.

(Herald Special.)  
Colon, May 21.—It has been learned  
today that in an exchange of mes-  
sages between President Madriz of  
Nicaragua and General Ariz, com-  
manding the steamer Venus, the latter  
was ordered by the president to bom-  
bard Bluefields, irrespective of the  
orders of the American officials of the  
gunboat Paducah. The Venus is said  
to be en route to Bluefields from  
Greytown, where it went when driven  
away by the American gunboat.  
Trouble is expected here between the  
two boats.

## LOSS NOT SO GREAT

FROM OKLAHOMA CYCLONE AS  
FIRST REPORTED—TOWN OF  
McARTY BLOWN AWAY—AGNES  
DEWBERRY WAS KILLED.

reports from Garvin county, swept by  
a tornado last night, state that the  
damage done is much less than was  
at first supposed. Only one town was  
totally destroyed, McCarty. Miss Ag-  
nes Dewberry, the daughter of a Bap-  
tist minister, was killed. Whitebed,  
Maysville, Paoli and Medill were  
struck by the tornado, but all escaped  
very serious damage. The damage to  
crops has been very heavy. An un-  
identified girl was found dead today  
near Pauls Valley.

## AMERICANS DEPARTED

Today to Appear Before The Hague  
In the New Foundland Fisheries  
Case—Century Old.

(Herald Special.)  
New York, May 21.—The American  
representatives to appear before the  
international arbitration tribunal at  
The Hague in the New Foundland fish-  
eries case sailed today on the liner  
Laplant. The court convenes on June  
first. The delegation consists of Sen-  
ator Root, as chief counsel, Alexander  
Anderson and I. Turney of Spokane,  
Samuel Elder of Boston, James Scott  
of the state department, Charles War-  
ren of Detroit, and Robert Lansing of  
Watertown. Judge Gray of Delaware  
will act as a judge of the tribunal.  
England is to send a number of dis-  
tinguished lawyers to represent her  
interests. The case in point is a  
century old.

Dover, England, May 21.—Count De-  
Lesseps, the French aeropaut, today  
duplicated the flight of Louis Beloit  
last summer by flying across the Eng-  
lish Channel from Calias to this city.  
He landed without a mishap.

## SPANISH HEIR BORN DEAD

Queen Victoria Is In Serious Condi-  
tion—King Hurries From Lon-  
don By Special Train.

Madrid, Spain, May 21.—Queen Vic-  
toria of Spain underwent accouchement  
today, a son being born dead. The  
queen's condition gives the at-  
tending physicians concern. The ac-  
couchement was unexpected at this  
time, and came while King Alfonso  
was in London attending the funeral  
of King Edward. The king was noti-  
fied by wire and is hurrying home by  
special train.

## TEDDY WAS ALL THERE

WAS THE BIG FIGURE AT A ROYAL  
LUNCHEON BY KING GEORGE.  
KINGS SOUGHT OPPORTUNITY  
TO MEET THE AMERICAN.

London, May 21.—Not until today  
was it learned what an important part  
Dr. Roosevelt played at the royal  
luncheon given by King George at  
Windsor yesterday, which event was  
attended by kings, princes, and royal  
representatives. All attending admit  
that Roosevelt was the dominating  
figure, and the royalties who had not  
formerly been presented to the Amer-  
ican crowded about him, eager for an  
introduction. Roosevelt was besieged  
with questions to learn his views on  
European politics and the questions  
of him continued for more than  
four hours. In fact, so intense did the  
interest in Roosevelt become that the  
sorrow of the hour was temporarily  
lost sight of. Roosevelt today is a  
guest at the country home of Amba-  
sador Reid.

## KEYNOTE IS SOUNDED

Champ Clark Sounds Democratic  
Keynote For This Year's Cam-  
paign—Made a Speech.

Washington, D. C., May 21.—Repre-  
sentative Champ Clark sounded the  
democratic keynote for this year's  
campaign in the house today. Clark

the tariff commission was in fact a

## COUNTESS CONVICTED

Countess Marie Tarnowska and Ac-  
complices Convicted of the  
Murder of Husband.

(Herald Special.)  
Venice, May 21.—Countess Marie  
Tarnowska and her accomplices, Law-  
yer Prilukoff and Dr. Nicklino Nau-  
moff, were convicted today for the  
murder of the countess' husband, and  
have filed a petition for a new trial.  
The countess was sentenced to prison  
for six years, Prilukoff for eight years  
and Dr. Naumoff for six years. The  
countess is in a serious condition as  
a result of the strain undergone dur-  
ing the long and dramatic trial.
