SPITZER'S CONFESSION

FORMER SUGAR TRUST EMPLOYEE
PARDONED BY THE PRESIDENT,
MAKES FULL CONFESSION OF
SUGAR SWINDLE IN WEIGHING.

(Herald Special.)
New York, May 23.—Oliver Spitzer, convicted last winter of conspiracy to defraud the government and sentenced to two years in the Atlanta federal prison, was called as a witness today against Charles R. Helke, a co-defendant on trial here in the sugar cases. After taking the witness stand and being sworn, Spitzer pulled a paper from his pocket, and said: "I have been pardoned by President Taft and have come here to tell the entire truth regarding the sugar frauds." He said he had been employed by the American Sugar Refining company for twenty-nine years, twenty-five years of which time he was dock superintendent at Williamsburg. The pardon was dated May 19th, and was an unconditional pardon. Spitzer made a complete confession of his part in the sugar frauds, which was contrary to his former testimony. He swore that as far back as 1895 he used devices by which sugar was underweighed. He said various contrivances were used to keep the weights down, and after the scales were ordered boarded up the checkers were supplied with two sets of steel springs with which they could manipulate the scale beams. He told of arranging a signal system to warn the checkers when the government inspectors were about. He said that after the springs were discovered he discharged himself and the company pay them wages until they were sent to prison. He also justified himself as the man who bored holes in the scales through which the springs were manipulated and by which device the government was defrauded of \$2,000,000 in duties on imports by the trust. He said the Wall Street office of the trust did not use the government weights for any calculations.

HE IS PLAYING FOR TIME

Estrada Prolonging His Hostilities
Until Such Time as the United
States Will Intervene.

Bluefields, Nicaragua, May 23.—The leading political advisers of Provisional President Estrada admitted today that the sole object of Estrada's prolongation of the war was in the hope that the United States would intervene. They admit that Estrada realizes that he can never crush the government, but believes he can keep up hostilities until the United States will step in and interfere pending the selection of a new president for Nicaragua.

ANOTHER SNELL MYSTERY

Son of Millionaire Snell, Who Was
Mysteriously Murdered, Was
Found Dead Today.

Chicago, May 23.—Albert J. Snell, a son of Amos J. Snell, the millionaire who was mysteriously murdered in 1888, and a brother to Mrs. Grace Snell - Coffin - Walker - Coffin - Layman - Love, known as the most married and divorced woman in the United States, was found dead in a cheap rooming house here today. The police have been unable to arrive at the cause of his death.

KIDNAPER DETECTIVE

Convicted of Kidnaping Marian Bleakley, the "Incubator Baby."

Kansas City, Mo., May 23.—F. H. Tillotson, the Kansas City detective convicted of kidnaping Marian Bleakley, the incubator baby, was today given an indeterminate sentence of from one to five years in the penitentiary. Tillotson will carry his case to the supreme court.

TRACTION RECEIVER

CHICAGO RAILWAY COMPANY UN-
EXPECTEDLY THROWN INTO
THE HANDS OF A RECEIVER
TODAY—UNABLE TO PAY.

Chicago, May 23.—The Chicago Railway company was unexpectedly thrown into the hands of a receiver today. The traction company owes the Westinghouse Electrical Manufacturing company \$69,000 which it is unable to pay on account of judgments against it aggregating \$1,300,000 outstanding.

DESSEPS FOUGHT DUEL

Uncle of the Aeronaut Fought a Duel
With Count Poligny and Was
Seriously Wounded.

Paris, May 23.—Lieutenant Ismael Desseps, uncle of Count Jacques Desseps, who crossed the English Channel in an aeroplane, was seriously wounded in a pistol duel with Count Poligny today. The two men quarreled over a woman and met to settle their differences. Two other duels are also reported, but were bloodless.

RECEIVER PLACED ON TRIAL

May's Landing, N. J., May 23.—William Seyler, charged with the murder of Jane Adams, his alleged sweetheart, at the Atlantic City pier on February 4th, was placed on trial here today. Special trains brought spectators here to witness the trial. The evidence against Seyler is principally circumstantial, and the efforts of the police to force the accused to make a confession resulted in an order to investigate the "Third Degree" methods of the police. The girl's body was found frozen in the breakers February 13th. Seyler, although a married man, had shown the girl marked attention, and the girl's mother had forbidden him further attentions to her daughter. On the night of her disappearance Miss Adams attended a dance and during the evening went out on the pier with Seyler. Wounds found on the girl's body showed evidence of a struggle.

ARE OFFICIAL RUFFIANS.

Complainants File This Charge
Against Oregon Forest Rangers.

Washington, D. C., May 23.—Through publication today of the printed report of the last session of the Ballinger-Pinchot investigation several score of letters and complaints received by the committee since January first against the forestry service were made public. One complainant referred to the forest rangers of Oregon as a "set of official ruffians," and another called them a curse to the country.
