GREAT VALUE TO SHIPS

Wireless Signal to Be Sent Out Every Midnight By Wireless Station on the Eiffel Tower, Paris.

(Herald Special.)
Paris, May 23.—Beginning with tonight a signal will be sent out every midnight by the wireless station on the Eiffel Tower to all ships at sea within range, which are equipped with a wireless receiving apparatus. This time signal, which will be given at midnight and will be repeated three times at intervals of two minutes, will be of great value to ships, particularly during the season of rains and fogs, as it will enable all ships equipped with a wireless receiver to ascertain their exact longitude, in case unfavorable atmospheric conditions prevented them from ascertaining their longitude by making the usual sun observations at noon.
