HOOK WORM INQUIRY OFF.

Not One Cent of the Rockefeller Fund to Be Spent in Texas.

Austin, Texas, May 30.—Not one cent of the Rockefeller million dollars for the investigation of the hook worm will be spent in Texas. State Health Officer Brumby briefly announced today that the Rockefeller hook worm commission will do no work in Texas.

When asked for the reason, Dr. Brumby said: "There are a number of hitches we don't care to discuss. Suffice it to say there will be no hook worm investigation. It was impossible for the state board of health and the hook worm commission to get together."

The commission wanted the board to duplicate the amount to be spent by the commission, and this is not possible, it is claimed.

Texas Coal Mine Operators Grant Increase—Almost Coal Shortage.

Fort Worth, Texas, May 30.—Five thousand men will return to work in the coal mines of Texas as a result of the contract signed here today between the mine workers and the Texas and Pacific Coal company and other Texas operators.

The men get an increase of 5 cents per ton, the same demanded by the Cincinnati international convention.

MORRIS IS FOR JOHNSON

Methodist Minister Says the Smith County Candidate is Not a "Visionary."

The following article is taken from the Galveston News:

Bryan, Texas.—In his circular letter to the Methodist ministers of Texas, advocating the election of Judge Poindexter for governor, Rev. John R. Morris of Cleburne, pastor of the Methodist church at that place, makes use of these words: "This is no time for a visionary in the governor's chair." Those who have kept up with the progress of the campaign, and who keep in mind the character and calling of the author of the sentence, will readily understand that his words are intended to belittle the character and candidacy of Hon. Cone Johnson, the prohibition candidate for governor in the present campaign. It is an echo of the sentiments put forth by Mr. Johnson's opponents, and it is but natural that their followers, even of the better class, should take it up and repeat it.

Personally, I am under no sort of obligation to Mr. Johnson; on the contrary, if I chose to be exacting and vindictive, I could easily, on purely personal grounds, find excuse for withholding from him my support. But my sense of obligation to a great cause prompts me to gladly give him my vote and whatever influence I may have, and my sense of right and justice prompts me to say that all intimations to the effect that he is a "visionary" are wholly unjustified by the facts. I lived in Tyler, Mr. Johnson's home town, for two years (1906 to 1908), traveling over a large section of East Texas, and had ample opportunity to know his standing socially, morally, professionally, politically and religiously, and I unhesitatingly affirm that Smith county, as well as all East Texas, has no citizen in whom the people more thoroughly confide, nor so whom they would give more en-
