## THOMAS HARDY GROWS OLD

Famous Novelist Celebrates His Seventieth Birthday Very Quietly at His Home Today.

(Herald Special.)

London, June 2.—Thomas Hardy, the celebrated novelist, had a quiet celebration of his seventieth birthday today at his quaint old home at Max Gate, near Dorchester, in the very heart of the country which he has made familiar to readers the world over. Much has been said and written about Mr. Hardy's work, but very little is known generally of the man himself. He is said to be a most difficult man to approach, and the story is told of how a pertinacious American autograph-seeker who visited Max Gate in quest of an addition to his collection was almost overcome by the shock when the famous novelist received his visitor most graciously and presented him with several autograph copies of his best known works. One of Mr. Hardy's eccentricities is his habit of invariably wearing two waist coats. In severe weather, it is said, the famous author has been known to don as many as four, but even on the hottest summer day he sticks to his two, the outside one being generally of the old-fashioned knitted sort.
