

# CANDIDATES ARE ACTIVE

MEET AND SELECT SPEAKING DATES AND PASS IMPORTANT RESOLUTION TOUCHING UPON THE CAMPAIGN.

The Anderson county candidates met in convention at the court house Monday and perfected organization for the coming campaign. Hon. Jno. R. Moore was elected chairman and R. M. Johnson secretary. The meeting being called to order, the following business was transacted:

A committee was appointed to arrange dates for the speaking at the various places in the county, to-wit: Beginning at Tucker, Tuesday, July 5 1910; Elkhart, Wednesday, July 6; Slocum, Thursday, July 7; Denson Springs, Friday, July 8; Dean & Johnson's Saw Mill (on the State Railroad near Field's Chapel), Saturday, July 9; Neches, Tuesday, July 12; Frankston, Wednesday, July 13; Brushy Creek, Thursday, July 14; Liberty, Friday, July 15; Montalba, Saturday, July 16; Blackfoot, Tuesday, July 19; Cayuga Wednesday, July 20; Tennessee Colony, Thursday, July 21; Palestine, Friday, July 22.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the candidates:

Whereas, there has been a practice in past campaigns for certain persons to approach candidates and the friends of candidates for money for working in elections; and

Whereas, such a practice is not subversive of good government and good morals and a flagrant violation of law; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the candidates of Anderson county, in meeting assembled, hereby place ourselves on record as condemning such a practice and hereby severally pledge that we will furnish to the proper officer all information that we may acquire during this campaign that may lead to the arrest and conviction of any candidate or the friends of any candidate offering money or promise of office or other reward for working in the election; and of any individual proposing to work for any candidate for any of the above named offices for such work.

The sub-committee appointed to estimate the expenses of holding the two primary elections and the assessments to be levied on candidates therefor, presented the following report, which was adopted:

Hon. G. R. Fowler, County Chairman:

We, the sub-committee appointed to estimate the cost of conducting primary elections, securing ballots and stationery necessary for the proper conduct of said primary elections, beg to report as follows: First, we favor

not levying an assessment against candidates for state officers, except candidates for representative, whose assessment shall be the sum of \$5.00 each; we further recommend that an assessment of \$5.00 be made against candidates for county surveyor; \$4.00 each for precinct officers, except Precinct No. 1, and the assessment for candidates for precinct officer for No. 1 shall be \$7.50 each. Candidates for all county offices shall be \$15.00 each, except candidates for county treasurer, whose assessment shall be \$10.00 each.

We further recommend that the county chairman be instructed to secure bids on printing ballots, securing primary election blanks, stationery, etc., necessary for the proper conduct of the primary elections, and that the party or parties submitting the lowest and best bid be awarded the contract or contracts.
