JOHNSON AT CLEBURNE.

One Hundred Citizens Formed the Reception Committee.

Cleburne, Texas, July 8.—Hon. Cone Johnson rode the three-mile law advocated by Judge William Poindexter, and discussed that candidate's position on the prohibition question, speaking to a large and enthusiastic audience in his opponent's home town this afternoon. Mr. Johnson spoke in a large tent. Its seating capacity is said to be 2500. Every seat was occupied and approximately several hundred were standing in the rear. Many

ladies were present.

Mr. Johnson was met at the station this morning by a reception committee of about one hundred Cleburne citizens.

Hon. E. A. Rice, representative from this district in the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth legislatures, presented General M. M. Crane of Dallas, who introduced Mr. Johnson.

"There is not but one man in this race, besides the gentleman I shall present to you, who stands a ghost of a show of being elected," said General Crane. "That is Mr. Oscar B. Colquitt. (A voice: Hurrah for O. B. Colquitt.)"

General Crane: "May the Lord say as much for you some time when you may need it, but I'm afraid he won't unless you mend your ways. (Long applause. Laughter.)"

"I present to you Cone Johnson of Tyler, a man who if elected will spend all of his time in office serving the people, as he is sworn to do, and who will not accept gifts, fees, perquisites or loans from any special interest." (Prolonged applause.)

Mr. Johnson began: "Knowing that I had some friends in Johnson county, at least fifty, (laughter), I thought I would accept the invitation to come here and deliver my message to you."

"They talk to you as if statutory prohibition had its origin on Mount Sinai and—(Wild applause drowned the remainder of the sentence.)"

"What was the command of Almighty God, when he said 'Thou shalt not kill' and 'Thou shalt not steal' and 'Thou shalt not lie,' except the statutory prohibition of the Almighty Ruler against these crimes?" he shouted when the applause subsided.

Another outburst of approbation was the reply. "Statutory prohibition," he added, "had its origin when the first legislative body of the world met. It is old as the history of civilization."

"I never heard so much preaching of the doctrine of legislative impotency in my life. You listen to any one of my opponents and they spend most of their time telling what cannot be done. What we want is a

leader who can tell you what can be done. (Applause. A stenorian voice: Who-o-ee!)

"I can get a wagon yard full of people before tomorrow morning, with all the qualifications of Poindexter, Colquitt and Davidson, who can tell you what you can't do. You want to know what you can do. (Applause.) "Great heavens alive! You call that man a statesider; why, he isn't even a county-wider. (Yells and applause.)"

"A church is a church in Texas and a school house is a school house, and a mother is a mother, whether in the country or in the city. If those in the country are entitled to protection the same sacred right is the privilege of the towns and cities."

"The man who has already promised to kill statutory prohibition, if it should be secured as our last resort, has already held up his hands and had the handcuffs of political promise put about them, and the key is in the possession of the whiskey interests of the state," continued Mr. Johnson.

"That man already has the handkerchief of a truce and surrender tied to his sword and waving in the air. He already compromised our cause. His doctrines are ruinous to us because his encouragement to the whiskey traffic is to kill submission by any means. And they'll move heaven and earth to kill it, and by fair means or foul. That man is already a menace to prohibition, because he has already advised the saloons that if they will kill submission they will be out of the woods." (Prolonged applause. A yell: Whoop-ee!)

A Small Fire.
