White and wife of the man who was also drowned, was not his wife, but an unknown woman.

Chief Niland later received a telegram from Mrs. White of Hutchinson asking for a description of the body of the man who was drowned and asked that the remains be taken care of until she arrives.

According to Chief Niland his correspondent in Hutchinson is unquestionably the wife of the man who was drowned. The body of the man has not been recovered.

the dispute over the strip of land arose between Mexico and the United States squatters have put in appearance in the zone in large numbers. Before final disposition of the case can be made by arbitration the elimination of them was thought necessary.

The Chamizal Zone is a strip of land opposite El Paso, which the Rio Grande threw into the United States by cutting itself a new bed. According to the tenets of the international law the boundary between two countries, where formed by a river follows a line established by the center of the main or deepest channel of the river. If applied as a cast iron rule in this instance this provision would give the Chamizal Zone to this country. Mexico, however, has protested the annexation of the strip of land and to settle the matter the commission in question was appointed. This country has gone into negotiations, it is understood, primarily for the reason that the river may play the same prank with a slice of United States territory, as, indeed, it came very near doing a few months ago near Brownsville. A peninsula formed by the river, and on which are located Old Fort Brown and the National cemetery, being at that time threatened to be added to Mexican territory by the Rio Grande cutting through the narrow neck now connecting it with the United States.

TO DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Electrocution of Napoleon Rivet, the Lowell Murderer, Will Take Place Monday.

(Herald Special.)

Boston, July 23.—All preparations have been completed at the state prison in Charlestown for the electrocution of Napoleon Rivet, the Lowell murderer, which will probably take place early Monday morning. The electrocution will be the first at the prison since the Chinese tong murderers were put to death last year.

The crime for which Rivet is to pay the death penalty was the murder of Joseph J. Gallou, a tinsmith, at Lowell, Feb. 27, 1908. The body of the murdered man was found in a plumbing shop in the section of Lowell known as Little Canada, which is inhabited almost wholly by French-Canadians. The prosecution alleged that Rivet's motive for the crime was his intention to collect the amount of an insurance policy, which had been pledged to him as collateral for a debt owed by Gallou.
