## RUEF IS SCARED NOW AMERICAN IS MISSING

It is Rumored in San Francisco That  
the Defendant May Enter a  
Plea of Guilty.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 16.—While Matt Sullivan, Hiram Johnson and J. J. Dyer are actively managing the Ruef prosecution, Heney is directing the case from his bedside. The attorneys will follow out his plans. Heney will be operated upon today and it is expected the bullet will be removed safely and that the wounded man will recover. Ruef appeared to be scared when the case was resumed this morning, and it is rumored that he will enter a plea of guilty and throw himself on the mercy of the court. The authorities scout the idea that Haas had the gun with which he killed himself in his shoe, and are positive it was smuggled to him from the outside by some confederate, and the officers are now looking for the individual. Meetings in sympathy with Heney have been held in various parts of the state. The feeling here is quiet today.

Operation Successful.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 16.—Assistant District Attorney Heney has been successfully operated upon. The bullet was removed and the patient is greatly improved. The doctors say he is now out of danger.

## BIG POSTOFFICE ROBBERY

Chicago Yeggmen Got Eighteen Thou-  
sand Dollars From the South  
Bend, Ind., Postoffice.

South Bend, Ind., Nov. 16.—Chief Wikie of the government secret service bureau is expected to arrive here today to head the hunters after the robbers who secured \$18,000 from the postoffice. The authorities lay the crime to Chicago yeggmen who have been operating freely in this section of late. The robbers tunneled through a wall from a store adjoining the postoffice, and every move shows that the work was done by experts. It is the biggest postoffice robbery of years in the west except the Chicago affair of several years ago.

PATRICK'S LAST CHANCE

Gone Unless Pardoned By Governor.  
Supreme Court Acts.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 16.—The supreme court today dismissed the appeal of Albert Patrick, the murderer of Millionaire Marsh Rice, and denied his application for a habeas corpus. Patrick claimed that commutation to life imprisonment increased his punishment. It is believed Patrick has exhausted every hope of freedom unless Governor Hughes should grant him a pardon.

Metropolitan Grand Opera.

New York, Nov. 16.—With every prospect of eclipsing all records for variety and brilliancy, the annual season of grand opera at the Metropolitan opera house opens tonight with a performance of "Aida." The majority of singers already known to patrons of the Metropolitan have been retained, while the management has added a number of artists of the first rank who have never before been heard in America. Foremost among the latter is Emmy Destinn, the famous Bohemian dramatic soprano, from the Royal opera house in Berlin, and the sensation of the recent season at Covent Garden.

Educational Congress.

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 16.—A notable conference of educators began in this city today with an attendance representative of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The principal purpose of the meeting is to discuss plans for the enlargement of the college at Walla Walla and to consider the educational needs of the Pacific Northwest. President Penrose of Whitman College is the host of the congress, which will continue in session several days. Prominent among those who are to deliver addresses are President Cyrus Northrop of the University of Minnesota, Secretary Anson Phelps Stokes, Jr., of Yale, and Dean Albert E. Burton of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Balloon Started on a Test Trip to the  
Atlantic Coast and Was  
Driven to Sea.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 16.—Every ship along the Pacific coast has been asked to make a close search for the missing balloon American, carrying Captain Mueller and J. K. Hutchinson, staff correspondent for the United Press. The balloon was one of two that started from this city to make a record in a flight from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast. The American started yesterday, according to schedule, and since leaving no trace of it has been heard. It is feared the wind drove it to sea, and that the men and balloon have been lost.

Balloon Located.

Later.—The American landed on Mermosa Beach. The occupants are safe, though they had a terrible battle against the unfavorable winds to keep from being driven to sea. The balloon landed on the very edge of the water.

NEW ISSUE OF STAMPS.

Leading Postoffices of Country Place  
on Sale New Stamps.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 16.—The new issue of postage stamps will be placed on sale at the leading postoffices throughout the country today. The denominations are of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 10, 13, 15 and 50 cents and \$1. On the one-cent stamp is the head of Benjamin Franklin in profile from Houdon's bust. All the other denominations bear the head of George Washington in profile from Houdon's bust. The border designs of all the denominations are identical, the head being an ellipse on end, with laurel wreaths on either side. The size of the stamps is the same as those in use heretofore.

Standard Oil Dividend.

New York, Nov. 16.—The Standard Oil company today declared a dividend of ten dollars a share, and made the annual dividend up to forty dollars, the same as has been earned by the company for the past three years.

## NO TARIFF REVISION

Of Importance Is Probable—Ways  
and Means Committee Making  
An Investigation.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 16.—The outlook for any substantial tariff revision is considered unfavorable as the result of the investigation conducted by the ways and means committee of congress. With few exceptions the witnesses who have been before the committee are opposed to tariff reductions, claiming in nearly every case that such reductions would tend to ruin business. Congressman Boutell of Illinois said: "It is the height of folly to expect tariff revision to benefit the consumer; no matter what congress does in the premises, individually the consumer will have to pay just as much for his goods, and the only result would be to make it possible for the importers and jobbers to make still greater profits."

Georgia Women's Clubs.
