## THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Of the Board of Trade This Home People Should Patronize Home Industries.

Minutes of the regular meeting of the Executive Committee of the Palestine Board of Trade, held Sept. 21. Members present: John R. Hearne, G. E. Dilley, Lucius Gooch, T. B. Greenwood, Hyman Pearlstone, C. B. Bratton, J. W. Ozment, W. T. Graham.

Minutes of the regular meeting of August 24 read and approved. Minutes of the meeting August 31 read and approved.

Communication from Wm. Bigley, Montalba, Texas, relative to establishing a broom factory in Palestine was read, and the secretary was ordered to correspond with him with reference to this matter.

At this time a discussion came up concerning the patronage that our local manufacturing enterprises are receiving at the hands of the citizens of our city, and the statement was made that some of our institutions are not receiving at the hands of our citizens the patronage they justly deserve.

It was fully pointed out in this discussion that products manufactured at home were equal, if not in some respects superior, to articles shipped in from abroad. Moved by Lucius Gooch and seconded by J. W. Ozment, that the secretary be authorized to put in the daily and weekly newspapers articles signed by the directors of the Board of Trade calling attention to the fact that such institutions as the Palestine Salt Works, Palestine Packing Company, Palestine Broom Factory and all like institutions should be patronized in preference to outside institutions, so long as the goods manufactured by them are the equal of goods shipped into our city. Carried.

## RAILWAY PEOPLE MEAN BUSINESS

Secretary of Board of Trade States that Active Work Will Soon Begin.

Secretary Frank Morris of the Board of Trade is in receipt of a letter from J. V. Watkins, promoter of the interurban and street railway, giving him details of the plans of his company, etc., and in it is this paragraph:

"We can say to your people that a contract is signed for the engineering work for the line, and without any unforeseen hindrance the work of locating the permanent route for the interurban railway between Corral and Palestine will be taken up in a very short time, and made ready for the construction as soon as possible, which will go forward there as soon as it is possible to do so. We are very much encouraged over the progress of the project."

Secretary Morris says these parties will soon be here again with a formal proposition he feels sure the city will accept. No doubt a street car line for Palestine, with interurban connections with Corsicana and immediate towns, would prove a great boon for Palestine, and the good old city should lend it every aid and encouragement possible.
