

# FOR A HOTEL

WELL KNOWN HOTEL MAN VISITS PALESTINE, AND MAKES CITIZENS A PROPOSITION.

Yesterday afternoon, in response to an invitation, several citizens met at the First National Bank building to meet Mr. H. H. Franks, an experienced and well known hotel man, to hear from him a proposition for an up-to-date hotel for Palestine, one object of the Board of Trade has in view. Mr. Franks was solicited to come to Palestine, and he comes with a definite proposition, in which citizens are asked to take stock in a hotel enterprise. Mr. Franks says he guarantees 7 per cent on the investment.

Mr. Franks is the managing director of the Gunter Hotel at San Antonio and the Bristol of Houston, two of the leading hotels of the state. His proposition, if it goes through, will give the city ample hotel accommodation, and a modern hotel in every sense.

Yesterday the visitor and a committee of citizens looked over the lots available for a hotel, and the gentleman remained over today for further conferences.

### Weather Conditions.

A narrow trough of low pressure extends from the Great Lakes to Northwest Texas, with the lowest barometer reading in Wisconsin. Scattered showers have occurred in the upper Mississippi valley, the northern Rocky mountain region and in Oregon, South Dakota and Washington. The eastern high pressure area is moving slowly eastward and the weather is moderating in the rear of this area. The barometer is rising in the northwest and the temperature has fallen somewhat in that section. The weather is warmer and partly cloudy in Texas this morning. Unsettled and cooler weather is indicated for this vicinity tonight and partly cloudy and cooler weather Wednesday.

# PROPERTY DAMAGED

## UNDER THE GUISE OF HALLOWEEN PRANKS SOME BOYS OR OTHERS DID EXTENSIVE DAMAGE AT SECOND WARD SCHOOL.

Most of the Halloween pranks played in Palestine last night were typical of the spirit of mischief and fun, and no actual damage was done, but as always happens some few people exceeded the limit and did actual damage to valuable property. Several cases have been reported to the city police. The most flagrant case is possibly the damage done to the property of the Second Ward school. Some one, and the police want to know who, tore away much of the new fence recently built through the efforts of the good people of that ward, and also tore away the steps leading over the fence, destroying or carrying away the pickets and lumber. This property had recently been fixed up and won the hundred dollar prize offered by Mr. G. E. Dilley for the best appearing school premises in the city on the first day of September of this year. There is no justification for such acts as this one, and the perpetrators should be punished. If it was done by small boys they should receive attention from their parents, and if older people are responsible they should be handled by the law.

## KITCHENER AS BEST MAN

The Hero of Khartoum, a Confirmed Bachelor and Woman-Hater, Breaks Into Society.

London, Nov. 1.—London was much interested today in the wedding of General Sir Archibald Hunter and Mary, Lady Inverclyde, which took place in St. George's, Hanover Square, in the presence of a large and fashionable assemblage. Public interest in the marriage was not due so much to the fame of the bridegroom or the wealth and social prominence of the bride as to the fact that Lord Kitchener attended his old comrade-in-arms as best man. The hero of Khartoum is renowned throughout the United Kingdom as a confirmed bachelor, even a woman-hater, and it is probable that never before did he approach so near the matrimonial altar.

The wedding ceremony was performed by the Archbishop of York, assisted by the Bishop of Ripon, and Prebendary Anderson, the rector of St. George's. Following the ceremony there was a reception at the home of the bride in upper Grosvenor street. The bride is the widow of Lord Inverclyde, who was chairman of the Cunard Steamship company. General Sir Archibald Hunter is one of the most famous commanders in the British army and was a particular favorite of the late king.

# THE REVIVAL

## LARGE MONDAY NIGHT CONGREGATION HEARD DR. ANDERSON AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

Although Monday night, the union revival service last night was more largely attended than any previous service. The song service was unusually good. All singers are urged to attend and assist in this part of the service.

Dr. J. H. Anderson was the speaker of the evening, and took as his text II Cor. 8:9: "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that ye through His poverty might become rich."

Attention was called to the riches of Christ prior to His advent in the flesh. He was rich beyond our powers of comprehension. Rich in creative power and glory; rich in possession of the universe. "The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof." He was rich in honor and in love; rich in immortality.

Yet this One who was so rich became poor. Paul speaks of this latter condition even as "Poverty." Consider it: the Son of God became a pauper! If you would know the poverty of Jesus while upon earth you have only to read the gospels. Poor in birth! He who had from eternity abode in mansions of heavenly splendor was in infancy sheltered in a stable and cradled in a manger. Poor in childhood! The Son of God running with rapid feet upon human errands, and performing the lowly tasks of that Galilean home. Poor in manhood! He who was the creator of worlds and of life must say, "The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head." Poor in friendship and sorrow! His followers forsook Him, one of His own betrayed Him; and the people whom He came to redeem crucified Him. Truly He became poor.

And the purpose was simply this: "That ye through His poverty might become rich." How rich we can hardly conceive now; yet some faint glimpse of the riches which are and are to be ours may be caught by considering His riches. We are to be "Heirs of God, and joint heirs with the Lord Jesus Christ." We are offered an "Inheritance incorruptible and undefiled and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven."

The sermon closed with an earnest, urgent appeal to all unsaved to accept the Christ, and enjoy the riches which through Him God offers unto men. It was a message long to be remembered by those present. The services will be continued throughout the week, and it is hoped that many will be brought to Christ. Christians are urged to be active in their work this week to the end that many may be saved. Special music will be provided each evening. Tonight the ladies' quartette of the Christian church will sing. You will regret it if you fail to hear them. The service will begin promptly at 7:30. All are invited.

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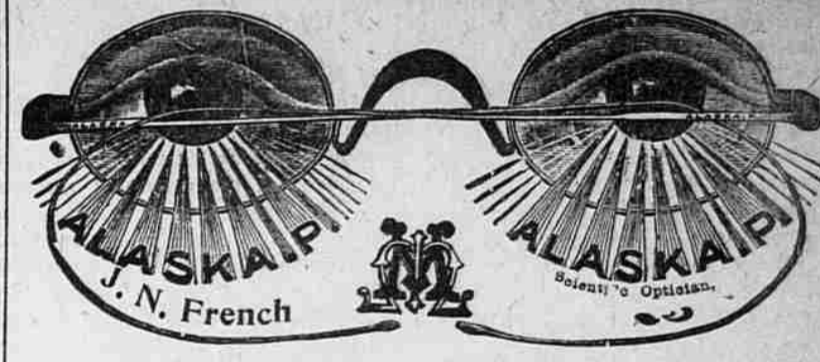
