The following comprise the new articles: An optical disc with all attachments, collision balls for explaining propagation of sound, Boyl's Law Apparatus, Voltmeter steam and gasoline engine models, glass models of lift and force pumps, hydraulic press and ram, model motor and dynamo, electrolysis apparatus, torsion apparatus, a triple beam balance, reading to hundredth of grain divisions, a dissected telephone and telegraph outfit, and numerous other articles.

A school song book has been adopted, and much pleasure is anticipated from the daily music.

Rev. L. D. Anderson delivered a profitable and interesting address on Wednesday morning. These weekly talks are an inspiration to the students, and are greatly enjoyed by them.

The new schedule of hours in the High School is working well. The attendance, punctuality and general work of the pupils has apparently been much improved by the change.
