THIRD SESSION OF ELEVENTH PARLIAMENT OF CANADA MEETS THURSDAY.

ROBIN COOPER'S CASE

On Docket For Trial at Nashville,
But Postponement is Likely.
Promotions and Changes in
Army and Navy.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—President Taft is due to arrive in Panama the first of the week and will spend four days in an inspection of the progress of work on the great Isthmian canal.

The third session of the eleventh parliament of Canada will meet Thursday. The session is expected to be of more than ordinary interest, in that there is the possibility that it will be the last before another general election. Reciprocity and the tariff, the naval policy and other large issues will come up for discussion.

The case of Robin Cooper is on the docket for trial at Nashville, Tenn., but there is a probability that the trial will be again postponed. Robin Cooper and his father, Col. Duncan B. Cooper, were convicted of the murder of former Senator Edward W. Carmack, the trial ending in the spring of last year. The verdict was reversed by the supreme court in the case of Robin Cooper and he was granted a new trial. He has since been at liberty on \$10,000 bail.

The annual horse show in Madison Square Garden and the opening of the season of the Metropolitan Opera company will divide the attention of society in New York and throughout a large section of the country.

At the annual banquet of the Canadian Club in New York, to be given Tuesday night at the Hotel Astor, a movement will be launched for the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Peace

At San Francisco representatives of the western states will meet in conference at the call of Governor Gillette of California to discuss plans for the rehabilitation of the Pacific coast merchant marine. C.; the American Federation of Labor, at St. Louis; the National Municipal League, at Buffalo; the National Wholesale Druggists' Association, at Dallas; the National Grange, at Atlantic City; the Texas Industrial Congress, at Houston; the Red River Improvement Association, at Sherman, Texas; the Mississippi-to-Atlantic Inland Waterway Association, at Pensacola, and the National Society for the Promotion of Industrial Education, at Boston.

MEETING OF CATHOLICS

Ninth Annual Convention of American Federation of Catholic Societies at New Orleans.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 12.—Delegates representing three million Catholic laymen of America are in New Orleans to take part in the ninth annual convention of the American Federation of Catholic Societies. The convention will be opened tomorrow morning with the celebration of a pontifical mass in the cathedral by Bishop Norris of Little Rock.

The regular sessions of the convention will begin Monday morning and continue until Wednesday, with President Edward Feeney of Brooklyn presiding. Most Rev. Diomedo Falconio, the papal delegate at Washington, will be in attendance as the representative of Pope Pius X. Other eminent representatives of the clergy who will take part in the proceedings are Archbishop Messmer of Milwaukee, Archbishop O'Connell of Boston, Archbishop Blenk of New Orleans and Bishops Heslin of Natchez, McPaul of Trenton, Canevin of Pittsburg and Shaw of San Antonio.
