The Jury Returns Unanimous Verdict.

A jury consisting of some of the most distinguished chemists of America has returned an unanimous verdict of "not guilty" in the case of Knocker et al vs. Coca-Cola. TOTAL ECLIPSE OF MOON

Will Be Visible Throughout the Greater Part of North America Wednesday Night.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 15.—The lenses of the big telescope at the Naval Observatory were given an extra rub and polish today in anticipation of observations to be made tomorrow night of the total eclipse of the moon. It will be the last eclipse of the moon this year and will be visible throughout the greater part of North America. In the eastern section of the United States and Canada the moon will enter the shadow of the earth promptly at 6 o'clock in the evening and the total eclipse will begin about one hour later.

To Try Robin Cooper Again.

The case was called today in the Davidson county criminal court. At the first trial Robin Cooper and his father, Colonel Duncan B. Cooper, were both found guilty. The supreme court subsequently reversed the verdict in the case of Robin Cooper, who had been sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment, and since the reversal the young man has been at liberty under \$10,000 bond.

The sessions will last two days and will have as speakers Dr. Charles W. Eliot of Harvard University, Dr. Felix Adler of New York, President Richard C. Maclaurin of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and other educators and public men of note.

Conference of Social Workers.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 15.—The New York State Conference of Charities and Correction met in this city today for what promises to be the most important annual meeting ever held by the organization. The sessions will continue over Wednesday and Thursday and will be devoted to the discussion of a wide variety of topics. The congestion of population and the suppression of the "white slave" traffic are to be given especial attention. Tuberculosis relief, alcoholism and the care of the inebriate, social service work in hospitals and among the insane, widows and deserted wives, and the conservation of eyesight are other matters that will be considered by the conference.

Conference on Charities.

Altoona, Pa., Nov. 15.—The second annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Conference of Charities and Correction, which opens here this evening for a session of three days, has brought together several hundred of the state's best known philanthropists, social workers and officials of charitable and correctional institutions. The attendance promises to be considerably larger than at the meeting held in Harrisburg a year ago. Industrial education and child labor, relief work of public and private agencies, the care of the feeble minded, and infant mortality and its prevention are among the important subjects to be discussed. The president of the conference is F. H. Niebecker, superintendent of the Boys' House of Refuge at Glen Mills.
