credit he will get a certificate of deposit, and his bank account will thus be launched.

The married woman may have an account of her own, the law providing that such an account "shall be free from any control or interference by her husband."

No one may deposit more than \$100 in any calendar month, while the total balance is limited to \$500. Except for these limitations, it is feared that the postal banks would have depleted the private savings banks.

Depositors will receive two per cent annual interest, and Uncle Sam expects to use the money for enough more to pay all expenses of the enterprise.

There are several things to commend the government's banking plan, and many people accept it as a gratifying step forward. No doubt the plan will create in many the saving habit, and if this is accomplished a great good is done. At any rate the working of this new governmental policy will be watched with much interest.

The barometer continues low over the lake region and the North Atlantic states, but no precipitation of consequence has occurred in that section during the past twenty-four hours. Light snow is reported in Idaho and Washington and rain in Kansas, Oregon and Texas. A disturbance is entering the northern Rocky mountain region from the British northwest territory. The weather is unsettled in Texas this morning, and temperature changes have been slight. The following heavy precipitation (in inches) has been reported during the past twenty-four hours: Taylor, 1.02. Unsettled weather is indicated for this vicinity during the next 36 hours.

AN EIGHTY FOOT ROAD

The Proposed Cut-Off From the New Boston Road to Elkhart Road Is Now Assured.

When the Michaux Park Land company secured possession of the Michaux land it was proposed to run an eighty foot street to the corporate limits, east and west, and then ask the county to continue the road on to a connection with the New Boston road. The property owners along the proposed extension agreed to donate the right-of-way for the road. Yesterday the plan was laid before the county commissioners, and the proposition was accepted.

So the public will soon be enjoying this driveway, which it is hoped will soon be placed in first-class condition.

PRINCETON AND YALE

Will Be Vaudeville Offering at the Lyric Tonight.

BACK TO AFRICA.

Bishop Heard Advises Members of His Race to Return to Africa.

"If a person has one-eighth of negro blood in his body, he is a negro," declared Bishop W. H. Heard, in delivering a missionary address last night at the A. M. E. conference that is in session at Grant's Chapel A. M. E. church. Continuing, the bishop said: "Our blood is like the blood of Christ. It owns everything that it touches. Africa is the place for the black man. God is reserving this country for my people. He made it possible for the negro to come over here to get in touch with the white man's civilization, and now that we are educated we should go back to this country. Africa must be saved, and you people must help to save it." Bishop W. H. Heard is from Africa, and is in this country to raise money to build a church in Monrovia, West Africa. At the close of his address the congregation laid on the table forty dollars to assist in his work.
