FIGHTING SPREADS DR. CRIPPEN WAS HANGED

REVOLUTIONISTS IN MEXICO
HAVE LAID SEIGE ON CHIHUAHUA
AND EXPECT TO CAPTURE THAT CITY.

(Herald Special.)

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 23.—Today's dispatches showed that a victorious Mexican revolutionary army under command of Madero is attacking Chihuahua and Castro Cienges and the capture of both cities is imminent.

The insurgents have possession of many towns. Excitement along the American border has not abated. It is certain arms are being smuggled across the border.

Additional reports from Gomez, Palacio and Parral declare that the municipal palace in Parral was burned and scores of persons killed, including the chief of police. Reports also say the government troops showed rare courage in attacking the rebels. The natives from the church tops and from houses defended themselves against the revolutionists. Machine guns have been mounted in Parral in preparation for an attack by some nine thousand rebels.

Telephonic advices from Torreon say thirteen hundred soldiers engaged in battle with four thousand revolutionists all night, and one hundred soldiers are reported captured by the revolutionists. Eight hundred additional soldiers are being rushed to the scene today.

The revolutionists are indignant over the reports that Americans have been killed. They assert these reports are circulated to discredit the uprising against Diaz.

Mexican Official's Comment.
(Herald Special.)

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 23.—Diego Rebo, a high government official of Mexico, arrived here today from Mexico City. He said the fighting at Orizaba was mainly confined to labor troubles, but added that reinforcements were being rushed there. He denounced Madero as an enemy to good government, and asserted that President Diaz is able to handle the situation. He admitted that anti-American riots embarrassed the government considerably.

Madero to Torreon.

Eagle Pass, Texas, Nov. 23.—Madero will reach Torreon today, where today's fighting is concentrated. The revolutionist force is increasing. It is reported here that Madero is accompanied by one thousand rebels, all mounted and armed. R. W. Cowen, customs collector here, is holding Albino Flores, the Mexican who conducted Madero across the Rio Grande.

A GOOD SHOW WAS GIVEN

By Union Labor at the Temple Theatre Last Night—Immense Crowd Present.

One of the largest audiences in the history of the New Temple Theatre was present last night to witness the Union Label Show, given under the auspices of the Palestine Trades and Labor Council. The entertainment consisted of stereopticon views of labels of various union-made goods and working cards of various unions. Mr. Collis Lovely of Boston, Mass., vice president of the Boot and Shoe Workers' Union, delivered a short and interesting lecture on "Unionism," and explained to the people present the necessity for buying union-made goods. Three thousand feet of good moving pictures were also shown, and three pretty illustrated songs given. The entertainment, as a whole, was excellent, and it was an appreciative audience that crowded the theatre for the occasion. Souvenirs in the shape of hand mirrors were presented all compliments of the Boot and Shoe Workers' Union.

AT 9 O'CLOCK THIS MORNING,
LONDON TIME — MET DEATH
WITH COURAGE—MISS LENEVE
COMES TO AMERICA.

London, Nov. 23.—Dr. H. H. Crippen was hanged today at 9 o'clock, London time. He met his death with the same courage that marked his conduct since his apprehension in flight from England, and his return to London and through his trial.

Miss Leneve did not see her lover after the painful parting yesterday. She will sail for New York today under the name of Miss Allen.

Before dying Crippen joined the Roman Catholic church and received the last rites of that church.

Although Crippen's confession was denied, the London Times reprints the story this afternoon in the third person, and apparently there is no way to prove or disprove his confession.

Important Facts and Dates in the Crippen Case.

January 31—Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, an American dentist, and his wife, Belle Elmore, an American-vaudeville artist, gave a dinner party at their house at 39, Hilldrop Crescent, London, and apparently were on the best of terms.

February 2—Belle Elmore resigned by letter as treasurer of Music Hall Ladies' Guild, saying she was going to California to see a sick relative.

March 26—London papers printed obituary advertisements of the death of "Miss" Belle Elmore in California, on March 23.

April 7—A similar obituary notice of Miss Elmore appeared in "The Stage."

June 30—Some professional friends of Mrs. Crippen, members of the Music Hall Ladies' Guild, whose suspicions had been aroused by certain discrepancies in the statements of Dr. Crippen concerning the death of his wife, informed Scotland Yard of their belief that Mrs. Crippen had been murdered. They had ascertained that Mrs. Crippen had not been a passenger on the liner la Touraine and had not died in Los Angeles, as reported in the obituary notices. They had also found that Dr. Crippen was living with Miss Ethel Clare Leneve, his pretty typist, at the house, No. 39 Hilldrop Crescent, that they claimed to be married and that the girl wore Belle Elmore's clothes and jewels.

July 8—Chief Detective Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard visited and interviewed Dr. Crippen, who told him that his wife, Belle Elmore, was not dead, but that they had agreed to separate and that he did not know what had become of her since she left him.

July 9—Early in the morning of that day the discovery was made that Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve had secretly left the house at No. 39 Hilldrop Crescent. Only Miss Leneve's French maid was left in the house. Dr. Crippen's assistant had received a letter from his employer, authorizing him to sell everything in the house and to use the proceeds to pay the

July 13—During a search of the deserted house, No. 39 Hilldrop Crescent, Chief Inspector Dew found the remains of a human body buried in the cellar. These were identified as the remains of Mrs. Crippen.

July 23—Captain Kendall of the steamer Montrose reported to Scotland Yard that Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve, the latter disguised as a boy, were passengers on board his ship, bound for Canada. Immediately upon the receipt of this information Inspector Dew hurried to Canada.

July 31—Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard, disguised as a pilot, boarded the steamer Montrose upon its arrival at the mouth of the St. Lawrence river, and arrested Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve.

August 20—Accompanied by Inspector Dew, Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve returned to England.

October 18—Beginning of the trial of Dr. Crippen upon the charge of murder.

October 22—Crippen convicted and sentenced to be executed on November 15.

October 24—Date for Crippen's execution changed to November 8.

October 25—Ethel Leneve placed on trial and acquitted.

November 3—Crippen's case argued before the Criminal Court of Appeals.

November 7—Execution of Crippen postponed to November 23.

CLOWRY RESIGNS TODAY

As President of Western Union Telegraph and Telephone Company.

New York, Nov. 23.—Robert C. Clowry, president of the Western Union Telegraph company, resigned today and was immediately succeeded by Theodore N. Vial, president of the American Telegraph and Telephone company. The latter concern controls the Western Union.

MORGAN AND DIAZ

BERGER SAYS MORGAN AND THE MONEY SHARKS OF WALL STREET ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR REVOLUTION.

(Herald Special.)

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 23.—J. P. Morgan and other money sharks of Wall street are indirectly responsible for the Mexican revolution, said Victor L. Berger, the socialist congressman, today. "Their influence has caused the United States government to support President Diaz in crushing his opponents, so that their own coffers may be enriched. Americans do not favor such a policy, as was shown in the last election in the United States. This government should not interfere with the domestic affairs of Mexico, in favor of Diaz and Morgan."

GIVEN DEATH PENALTY.

Dr. W. J. McNaughton of Georgia is Seeking a New Trial.

Columbus, Ga., Nov. 23.—Argument was heard here today on a motion for a new trial in the case of Dr. W. J. McNaughton, who was recently convicted at Swainsboro and sentenced to death for the alleged murder of Fred Flanders, a prominent planter of Emanuel county. The case has already attracted much attention throughout this section of Georgia, and the outcome of the efforts to save the condemned man from the gallows is awaited with keen interest.
