INSURGING ONCE MORE

FORMER PRESIDENT BONNILLA OF HONDURAS IS LEADING A BAND OF REVOLUTIONISTS. SEVERAL TOWNS TAKEN.

San Juan, Del Sur, Nicaragua, Nov. 29.—Revolutionists under former President Bonnilla are reported to have captured several ports on the Atlantic side of Honduras, according to advices received here today. It is stated that federal troops sent to recapture the ports joined the revolutionists against the government.

MADERO TO WASHINGTON

Mexican Revolutionist Seeks Recognition For His Cause From The United States.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 29.—It is reported on good authority today that Francisco I. Madero has left Mexico and is en route to Washington to confer with his brother, Gustavo Madero, and to seek recognition from the United States government. Gustavo Madero was appointed confidential agent for the revolutionists several days ago, but when he applied for recognition he was notified that the Washington government would recognize only the accredited Mexican ambassador.

MANDAMUS FOR HASKELL

Supreme Court of Oklahoma Today Issued Order Against Governor In Bank Cases.

Guthrie, Okla., Nov. 29.—The supreme court of Oklahoma today issued a mandamus against Governor Haskell compelling him as chairman of the state banking board to submit for investigation all records and documents of the Columbia State Bank and Trust company of Oklahoma City and two other Oklahoma institutions whose failure a year ago aggregated \$5,000,000, and caused a big sensation in the state and throughout the southwest.

MADERO UNINJURED

And Is Planning to Strike Another Blow at Mexican Government.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 28.—That Francisco I. Madero is not only not injured, but that he is safe in the Laguna district organizing his forces, is the news brought to his family by a courier who comes direct from him. The man, who is a native of Mexico City, though he has lived a number of years in San Antonio, says that Madero is safe and well and is at present gathering his force near Laguna, in the Laguna district, near Lerdo and Parral. This district lies in a fertile valley surrounded entirely by mountains, and the courier states that for the present Madero is safe, since the surrounding towns, such as Lerdo, Parral and Torreon, are friendly. Madero was not wounded at any time, says the envoy, and is constantly gathering allies to his standard. Among these are said to be high government officials and a number of wealthy young men from Vera Cruz, who have thrown in their lot with Madero, who, declares his envoy, is confident of success. In case the worst comes to the worst, though, says the courier, who acknowledges he has come on a mission, though of the nature of which he will give no hint, Madero can always get out to the Pacific coast and be out of danger before he can be pounced upon by the federal authorities. As far as the confiscation of the Madero estates is concerned, the courier states Madero is not much concerned, since the bulk of his interests are in the hands of friendly Americans. How long the man who comes from Madero will remain in San Antonio is not known, but he declares that he will return to Mexico, and to his leader, Francisco I. Madero, just as soon as he has completed his mission.

SERVANT'S TRIBUTE

COUNT TOLSTOI'S COACHMAN LAYS DOWN AT FOOT OF AUTHOR'S GRAVE AND SLOWLY BLEED TO DEATH.

Berlin, Nov. 29.—Lying on Count Tolstoi's grave at the foot of Poverty Oak at Yasnaya Polyana, the author's coachman, who aided his master in his flight which ended in death, opened the veins of his wrists and slowly bled to death. His dead body was found today.

Is What Judson Harmon Told Doctor Woodrow Wilson Today—Two Presidential Possibilities.

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 29.—Ohio's governor today said to New Jersey's governor, "I'm very glad to meet you, Doctor," and as they greeted each other the hopeful democracy of Frankfort looking on professed to see in it a life-like tableau of the next president and vice president shaking hands. While Governor Judson Harmon was shaking hands with Dr. Woodrow Wilson, Governor Marshall of Indiana, another Democratic hope, stood close by.

BODIES ARE RECOVERED

Thirteen Bodies, Victims of the Jumbo Mine Explosion, Have Been Brought Out.

Jumbo, Okla., Nov. 29.—Thirteen bodies, a tribute to America's great mining industry, lie in a little rough lumber shack of the Choctaw Asphalt company. The improvised morgue will today be given over to the relatives of the dead, after the state mine inspectors and coroners shall have made their reports. Gertold Roberts was unusually fortunate. The rescuing shift found him half unconscious two hundred feet down the channel, and he is the only one of the fourteen buried by the explosion who lives today.
