AMERICAN WOMEN SNUB JAP NAVAL OFFICERS

(Herald Special.)
Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 7.—A demonstration of the anti-Japanese feeling in the west and especially in California was made here today by the society folk when prominent members of the society crowd refused to attend the ball planned for the honor of the visiting Japanese naval officers.

Incensed by the animosity shown, Admiral Yashiro, commanding the Japanese vessels, today canceled the invitation to the school children of the city to visit the ships of the

mikado. It is expected every entertainment planned for the Japanese officers will be canceled immediately.

Many believe that the refusal of the society women to dance with the Japanese officers will result in something more serious than a mere display of local feeling. In view of the splendid reception accorded the officers of the American Atlantic fleet at Tokio two years ago, it is believed the uncalled for snub administered here has far-reaching possibilities, even to causing a breach between the United States and Japan.

BALLINGER IS FAITHFUL AND EFFICIENT OFFICER

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7.—Absolute exoneration has been accorded Richard A. Ballinger of Washington, the "persecuted" secretary of the interior.

Findings of the Committee.
Washington, Dec. 7.—Absolutely exonerating Secretary of the Interior Ballinger of all charges brought

against him, the majority report of the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee was presented to congress at noon.

The report sums up in its findings that "Ballinger is not an enemy of or hostile to a reasonable and judicious policy of conservation, and that no ground whatever has been shown justifying the opinion that he is not a faithful and efficient officer."

LAKE WAS BURNED OFF CHINESE SLAVE GIRLS

Oil Burned From Surface of International and Great Northern Shop Lake This Afternoon.

This afternoon shortly before 2 o'clock, the lake back of the International and Great Northern shops was set fire to burn the accumulated oil from the surface of the water. The fire made a hot one and sent up a great volume of smoke. The oil is burned off every few months.

ATTEMPT ON A CONSUL

Garage of Italian Consul at Seattle Blown Up Today, and Residence Damaged.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 7.—The garage of Dr. J. Chilloné, Italian consul, was blown up by dynamite today and every window in his home was shattered. No one was injured by the explosion. Chilloné declares the dynamiting was not the work of the Black Hand Society, but was done by some personal enemy. His home is for the present heavily guarded.

REVOLUTION FINANCED.

Said to Be Growing to Unusual Proportions in Chihuahua.

Chihuahua, Mexico, Dec. 6.—Passengers arriving here from the west tonight confirm the stories of insurrecto strength. Madero's whereabouts are not known, but the influx of arms and ammunition continues. Travelers pretend not to know sentiment in other parts of the country, but every bit of non-partisan testimony this week shows that the revolution in this state is of unusual proportions, and that there is big money behind it.

So far there have been three encounters in this state. The fight here last Sunday may be called a draw, but at San Andres three weeks ago and at Pedernales last week the insurrectos undoubtedly were the victors.

Census Figures.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7.—The population of North Dakota is 577,056, an increase of 80.6 per cent. South Dakota has 583,888, an increase of 45.4 per cent.

Regular Organized Traffic in Girls by San Francisco Gang—Government Is Busy.

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 7.—The existence of an organized association of Chinese and Americans here and in Hong Kong to procure Chinese slave girls for sale in the United States has been revealed by the investigation of the government secret agents. It was discovered in the course of the investigation that the regular price of a Chinese girl is \$3000. Many of the girls brought over are believed to be members of wealthy Chinese families kidnaped by agents of the association. Ten to twenty such girls are brought over every trip of the big liners, making an average profit of \$40,000 for the ring.

HE WANTS LOWER MEAT

Congressman Sulzer of New York, a Democrat, Will Fight High Tariff Prices.

New York, Dec. 7.—Congressman Sulzer, democrat, of New York, introduced a bill today proposing a reduction of the tariff on meats and cattle. In discussing his bill the congressman said: "They are selling American meats in London and Paris and Berlin for from eight to fifteen cents a pound lower than in America. I intend to fight such conditions to the end or find a remedy."

IMPORTANT MEETING

FARMERS AND TRUCK GROWERS CALLED TO MEET AND ORGANIZE ASSOCIATION FOR TOMATO GROWING.

Tomorrow afternoon there is to be held at the city hall a most important meeting of farmers, truckers and business men, the purpose of which is to organize for the growing of tomatoes in this county for car lot shipments.

It is recognized that tomatoes have grown to be one of the staple crops of this section, and a big money crop.

The entire crop grown in this section last year did not begin to supply the demand, and the crop sold at good prices throughout the season. This county should engage in cultivating this crop to an extent that buyers will be attracted to bid on and buy the cars of tomatoes as they are loaded, as is done at Tyler, Jacksonville, Arp, Troup, and other towns.

Let every business man who can possibly leave his business for an hour be on hand to lend encouragement in the movement.

This meeting was called by President G. A. Wright of the Board of Trade, and notices of the meeting were mailed out to the farmers and prominent citizens of the city and county. The meeting is called for 2 o'clock.

The following letter received by

Secretary Sterne of the Board of Trade explains itself:

Tyler, Texas, Dec. 5th, 1910.

Mr. C. A. Sterne,
Secretary Board of Trade,
Palestine, Texas.

Dear Sir:—Replying to your letter of the 29th, inclosing circular of meeting to be held Thursday, December 8th.

For the benefit of those interested, will advise that there were 739 cars loads of tomatoes shipped this season from Smith and Cherokee counties, on a basis of 875 crates to the car, making a total of 690,375 crates, and making what we think a conservative estimate of 60 cents per crate, will bring a net profit of \$414,225.00 to be distributed among the growers of these counties; and I feel assured, with the organization of an association for Anderson county, the growers will do equally as well, and trust that your efforts will be successful.

Mr. Cobb and myself will arrange to attend and give you all assistance possible.

Five Inches of Snow.

New York, Dec. 6.—Nearly five inches of snow has fallen in New York since 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon, and it is still snowing intermittently tonight. The weather bureau at Washington says: "Snow for tomorrow." The storm brought about the usual delay in suburban and street car traffic, but there was nothing like a tie-up. Through trains from Buffalo were on an average of an hour late at Jersey City, those from Chicago and mid-western points from an hour to three hours late. The minimum temperature of the day for the greater city was 22; the maximum 27. A blizzard which originated in the Tennessee mountains and traveled eastward swept the Atlantic seaboard.
